MIKE BOSMAN

The four were inducted as members of Council by Fr Terry Wilke in the start of the year Eucharist Service held in the Memorial Chapel on 19 January 2011. On that occasion Grant Nupen delivered the sermon to the school.

Mike Bosman was born in 1960 in Johannesburg. He is currently CEO of One Digital Media, a communications company based in Stellenbosch. The fusion of technology, communication and retail environments is his work and passion. He has addressed local and international conferences on the topic. Mike completed his schooling at Bishops in 1978 and furthered his education at the University of Cape Town and Harvard University, studying finance and accounting and reading for a Masters degree in law. He qualified as a Chartered Accountant after working at Coopers & Lybrand (today PWC). From 2004 to 2006 he was the Group CEO of TBWA, which included South Africa's top-ranked creative advertising agency TBWA\Hunt\Lascaris. In 2000, Mike was appointed President and Chief Operating Officer of FCB North America, the largest advertising agency in the US at the time. He was based in New York and headed up all of the FCB offices in the United States and Canada. He served as a member of the worldwide executive committee and as an executive main

board director of FCB Worldwide. Prior to that, from 1997, Mike was the Chairman and CEO of South African advertising agency FCB Lindsay Smithers and of the FCB Africa region. Mike was named as the Advertising Man of the Year in South Africa three times, most recently in 2006. He is the Chairman of the World Scout Foundation based in Geneva; Chairman of the Board of Governors of Bridge House School and a Board Member of the Oprah Winfrey Leadership Academy Foundation and a non executive director of Anglovaal Industries Ltd (AVI Ltd). Mike flies jets and helicopters and is a helicopter flying instructor. He was formerly a Captain in the SA Air Force with 110 Squadron flying jets. Mike has won several aviation awards including South African national colours, two World Championship silver medals and the Gold Wings of the Aero Club of South Africa. Mike is married to Sabine and they have two teenage daughters, Lisa and Aimee. They live in Franschhoek. The Bishops Community welcomes Mike to Bishops as Chairman of Council. *Paul Murray*

A FAREWELL TO STAFF



KHONA MHLABENI

Khona Mhlabeni was Xhosa head of department for nine years and our resident African languages and culture scholar. He departed from Bishops at the end of 2010 to continue a journey begun many years ago, when he first left his rural Eastern Cape home, ultimately to study and work as an academic practitioner of the Xhosa language. Teaching at Bishops, a prestigious, largely Anglo-centric independent school, in many ways so far removed from Khona's origins and identity, he represented a component of South Africa which most of us in the broader Bishops constituency possess scant experience. Khona's determination

to transcend this cultural gulf is testimony to his inner strength and courage.

Before embarking upon his university studies during the 1990s, Khona moved through several work environments vastly different to teaching, including working in the early 1980s as a labourer in the Stutterheim timber industry and two years underground as a gold miner in Stilfontein. Later in Cape Town, Khona was employed part-time as a Xhosa tutor, teacher and lesson designer at various places, for age levels ranging from kindergarten to university students. At UCT Khona graduated with a BA in Xhosa and by 1996 had completed an HDE; obtaining a BA (Hons) degree in Xhosa at Stellenbosch in 2000. Khona strove to promote African languages, literature and cultural studies, making it clear the extent to which he relished his own culture and language. Soon after his arrival at Bishops Khona encouraged the black students to use their African first names rather than a western-originated alternative. Besides teaching his many Xhosa classes Khona also served as a WCED moderator and examiner; he ran a regularly attended African languages society, coached rugby and cricket, besides also serving as a chapel warden.

Khona was entirely secure within his own cultural milieu and endeared himself to his colleagues with his capacity to rise above the absurdities of highly defensive political or cultural positions.

With English having become the de facto South Africa official language, most local African languages face a significant challenge in maintaining any long term viability as academic disciplines. It is teachers of Khona's commitment and learning that will count much in trying to ensure the scholastic future of Xhosa and other African languages. In short, Khona gained a great deal of respect amongst staff and pupils for his steadfast promotion of Xhosa

Khona's journey now continues as he has moved off to teach elsewhere the culture and language so dear to him. His colleagues wish him good luck and God speed.

ALEXANDRA (ZANDI) BRYANT

In all the time I have known Alex (Zandi) Bryant I have never known her not to speak her mind fearlessly, on any matter, anyone or anything ... something she might have learned as a farm girl or at boarding school or later as a university student where her feminist and political ideas evolved. She is not afraid and she is not dull. She is one of those multi-talented teachers who occasionally blesses us for all too short a while with his/her special genius – Zandi's was to serve the school in a double

capacity: as a highly experienced and expert Xhosa teacher, an itinerant LO teacher and, after hours, to run the Sanatorium as the Sister-in-charge. That she managed to carry out her duties in both fields with such dedication is a tribute to her expertise and stamina. Everything Zandi tackles she does with energy, passion and commitment and her wicked sense of humour and sharp wit flavoured all her lessons in the classroom and interactions with staff and boys. She showed compassion, calmness and competence in dealing with the flu epidemic in 2009 and then again with the measles epidemic in 2010. We are very sad that Zandi decided to leave Bishops after 4 years of valuable service and to move on to other exciting and perhaps more rewarding ventures: she is now lecturing at UWC and has bravely embarked on an Honours Degree as well. We will miss her incisive commentary on life at Bishops. We wish her all good luck and good fortune in her new direction and thank her deeply for everything she has done for the boys at Bishops. CHAPLAIN'S REPORT


All too soon the holidays arrived and left us facing the very busy fourth term of 2010. Sadly the euphoria of the World Cup had soon faded and was replaced by the scramble of preparing for Matric finals, the Epic and the many other traditional end-of-term and end-of-year functions. Eucharist on 5 October in the Memorial Chapel started the term and was a sobering moment for the Matric group as they did this for the last time as boys in the College. As we settled into the term, a contingent of 47 boys, staff, parents and the LEAP school joined the Global Leadership Summit for a two day conference in Parow. This is part of the global network of Christian leaders who meet annually under the leadership of the Willow Creek Community Church based in Chicago under the directorship of Bill Hybels. A well organised two days followed with a variety of challenging video presentations and much discussion. Via video link we were able to tune into the wisdom of business leaders such as Jack Welch and Jim Collins, to be exposed to the 'Tom's shoe story' in an interview with Blake Mycoskie and to really ponder the meaning of life with Jeff Manion as he spoke of the Land Between. Adam Hamilton spoke of the fallibility of leaders and Daniel Pink talked of motivation and the need for leaders to think and appreciate those who work with them. Many of the lessons learnt at the GLS have been brought back to the school and are a source for ongoing debate and training. We are looking forward to the next conference in October 2011 and hope to see many more members of the Bishops community



join us at that time.

Monday 18 October saw us wave a fond farewell to the Matrics as they attended a splendid morning which combined Prize Giving with the Valedictory Service. It was good to see the matric group able to celebrate the achievements of their peers and then to hear the fine speeches of the Valedictorians and Head boy as they bid farewell to the College.

Bishops Praise took place the following week. It was good for us as a school to come together and to give thanks to God. The Archbishop, Thabo Makgoba was in attendance and commended to boys on their fine singing. He then gave an informal address encouraging the boys to think of those less fortunate than themselves. The school than made a donation to his School for Haiti appeal fund and thanked him for his time with us. An interesting chapel talk was made by John McInroy who shared his dream of international friendship and closeness with the boys and introduced then to the www.redsockfriday. com website. He tells the story of, as a boy at Bishops, noticing an elderly serviceman who always wore red socks to the Remembrance Day service. On asking he was told of the pact made between boys who then went off to war, many to never return. The red socks reminded them of their friends and the strong links of friendship forged at school and beyond. After completing his studies overseas, he was looking for a way to remember his friends and used the same concept which has now grown into an international organisation supplying red socks, global friendship and close links with others across the world. He invited the boys to look up the website, to obtain their red socks and to spread the message of friendship and camaraderie. 






In 16 days, boys did a combination of two overnight hikes, bike riding, water skiing, kayaking, 24 hour solo, community work in schools, GPS orienteering, abseiling, horse riding, viewed rock art, worked on their own art, did team building exercises, swam, cleared alien vegetation, cooked for themselves, tracked leopards (part of a group even saw one!), learnt about group dynamics, learnt more about themselves and some even found pleasure in getting to know staff better.

One of the things that has stood out this year is the strengthening of the relationships with the three school communities we are linked with for our social awareness programme. In addition to Elizabethfontein Primary (Founders) and Grootkloof Primary (School), this year will see Dwarsrivier Primary coming to Cape Town for a weekend – thanks to White House.

Taking a group of 130 boys into the bush is not without its potential for drama – fortunately the fire that was started in Dwarsrivier was not as serious as it could have been; fortunately the head of a puffadder was squashed and not its tail – this after three boys and a member of staff had, unbeknown to them, walked over it; and all the twisted ankles occurred with boys who were wearing ankle height shoes and not boots. As with each year, we've learnt new things from this past year and will be doing our utmost to educate boys, parents and staff even more



than ever before but realise, despite our best intentions and actions, which an operation of this magnitude will inevitably result in a curved ball or more.

One of the primary aims of Epic is to provide an avenue for our young men to venture into becoming a man through the activities on offer. It is wonderful therefore to have our last night to which fathers or another significant father figure come to the mountains to welcome the young men back into the tribe, this after the Blessing of Boots Service (a first) provided the opportunity for parents to 'send' their boys away for the 16 days.

My thanks to all involved – the communities in the Cederberg at our bases and in the towns, those who run the bases, the paid volunteers, the Old Boys, ex teachers at Bishops, the parents who made donations, those who lent us transport and a boat, the support staff at Bishops and the staff themselves. What a privilege to be part of such a dynamic team.

THE BISHOPS MUSEUM & ARCHIVES

The Bishops Museum and Archives invited a number of visitors to tea on 2 November 2010. The Honoured guests included Jamie McGregor OD, Michael Fielding OD, Robin Mills OD, Rogan Earp-Jones OD, Jeremy Lawrence OD, Mrs Jackie Diesveld (ex Staff) and Syd Cullis OD. Present at the tea were Mr Grant Nupen, Mr Michael King, Mr Vernon Wood (College), Mr Greg Brown (Prep), Mr Marcus Bizony, Mr and Mrs Tim Hamilton-Smith (OD Union), and Staff from the Principal's Office, Mrs Linda Dinan, Mrs Yolanda Raman, Mrs Rosemary Wilke and from the Prep Museum Mr Melvyn Wallis-Brown and Mr Basil Bey and Charlie (Mr Bey's sheep dog). After a word of welcome to guests Mr Nupen asked Paul Murray to speak to the various donations that had been made. He referred to the Alex McGregor Papers; the Fielding Cup, the architect's impression of St Thomas's donated by Robin

Mills Mills and a donation by Rogan Earp-Jones. Paul expressed his thanks to Basil Bey for his hard work on a daily basis in the Museum. Then Paul handed over to Michael King who spoke to the newly framed Rhodes pictures now hanging on the walls of the Museum. There are three portraits that we had framed: one of them was one of two presented to Bishops by Col. Frank Rhodes in 1904 – they were both artists' proofs of the famous picture of Rhodes by Herkomer. The second is a portrait by Violet, the Duchess of Rutland, completed in 1898. It was given to Frank Reid in 1938 by C. Miller who was then the Assistant Secretary to the Rhodes Trust. Frank in 1951 gave the picture to Jack Manning, OD Manager of the Rhodes Trust Farms, and he, on his retirement in 1978 presented the portrait to Bishops. The third portrait came into our hands via the van Renen family (ODs). Rhodes gave this portrait to Harry van Renen in Kimberley; Harry died in 1914 leaving the picture to his cousin Rudolph, who donated it to Bishops in March 1950. Rhodes was a good friend to Bishops; in 1896 he donated a considerable sum of money towards the completion of the North End Brooke Wing in Founders. He also presented the College with the Rhodes Cup (Inter-House swimming trophy) and, of course, we have the Rhodes Scholarship.

The Global Issues Network made a positive start to 2011, gaining many new members and re-forming the image of the Society as one to address every

Global Issue, rather than just Sustainability and Global Warming. Under the new system, boys choose their own Global Issue and prepare and present their findings on amongst others: poverty, healthcare, media, technology, globalisation, education, environment, sustainability or infectious diseases. The plan for the coming term involves working in groups to publish projects through the medium of the Student News Action Network, the worldwide social network dedicated to the pursuit of solutions for global issues. Thanks to their obtaining support from Taking IT Global, there is now a substantially larger audience to read, interpret and comment on the projects produced by the members, providing valuable feedback and allowing for global collaboration. Aside from this research, several projects of note are currently under way - in order to aid research on the effect of Global Warming on tree growth for the Smithsonian Institute, several members have begun measuring designated trees around the school regularly and submitting the measurements. The senior members of the Society, as well as the Portfolio members, have restarted the Global Issues Minute, a weekly presentation to the school during Leaders' Assembly in order to raise awareness, with particular regard to UN International Days such as World Water Day on the 22nd of March. Another project due for completion over the next two terms is the Retrofit Plan arising from the Green Audit of 2009/2010. The Audit aimed to address the Energy, Water and Waste sectors in White House, where the Kitchen was targeted for the Retrofit due to its high consumption of energy and water and its high production of unsorted waste. The implementation of the Retrofit Plan will be undertaken by the Society as a whole, led by the two Chairmen (Thomas Düsterwald and Peter Beare) and by those choosing Sustainability as their point of focus. Our website has recently been updated, and can still be accessed via Links on the Intranet. The new website includes a page dedicated to screening the video of the week as seen in the Global Issues Minute and a members list, which has swelled substantially this term to include many new members from Grades Eight and Nine. The Global Issues Network has much to do over the next three terms, and we look forward to researching and addressing these issues in the months to come.

On Tuesday, 8 February all Bishops grade twelve history students went on an historical ex-

cursion to the centre of Cape Town, complementing a heritage assignment which they had recently completed. The tour was accompanied by history teachers Messrs Dave Mallett, Paul Murray and Dr Rodney Warwick. It encompassed the Company Gardens and the monuments therein; St George's Cathedral; the Groote Kerk and the War Cenotaph in Adderley Street. Another specific purpose of the excursion was to make our senior history students more aware of the rich layers of cultural, colonial and political history, along with the various war remembrance structures, which together constitute a significant portion of the physical heritage of our city. Dr Warwick spoke to the group on this often publically little remarked upon physical heritage within the Cape Town city centre, such as General Timson Lukin's stature in the Company Gardens and the Adderley Street Cenotaph, in terms of what these structures once meant to past generations of Capetonians. Yet they remain relevant to this day in terms of marking both history and the human sacrifices for ideals of honour, patriotism and freedom from tyranny. Mr Murray expertly described the architectural uniqueness and respective histories of St George's Cathedral and the Groote Kerk, along with the Anglican cathedral's historical relationship with Bishops. It was a worthwhile morning whereby our history students, besides enjoying a break from lesson routines on a hot summer's day, returned hopefully considerably more informed on aspects of Cape Town's history that are often left unappreciated or understood by many of the city's residents.

SOCIETY MEETINGS

This report covers this term and the final meeting held in 2010 while Andrew Curtis was still Chairman. Tobin Davenport has been appointed Chairman of the History Society for 2011; congratulations to him. On 17 November 2010 the society hosted Dr David Klatzow; a local very highly regarded forensic pathologist who has recently had a book published entitled: *Steeped in Blood*, concerning principally the appalling and still unsolved murder from March 2005 of the Stellenbosch University student Inge Lotz. Dr Klatzow explained some of the forensic methodology to the society members, used in court to render the police's case against the accused invalid. Dr Klatzow demonstrated how fabricated evidence cannot stand up to a sophisticated forensic examination. He further explained how a combination of government employment policies and police mismanagement, have rendered the police services with inadequate numbers

of forensic investigators, resulting in vast caseloads of crimes not being carried timorously through the court processes. Dr Klatzow's talk was enough to sober anyone up to the grim reality of police's crime investigation capacity. On the 22nd of February the History Society had its first meeting for 2011 where Mr Athol Trollip, the Democratic Alliance's parliamentary leader addressed members on political prospects for South Africa during 2011. Mr Trollip focussed his talk largely upon concerns regarding unemployment and the DA's aspirations to move beyond its governing Cape Town, the Western Cape and some municipalities within this region, towards governing other metropoles, with Pretoria and Port Elizabeth being amongst the party's ambitions. Mr Trollip fielded a very large number of questions after his talk, ranging from some boys' concerns regarding affirmative action and BEE, to queries on how the DA would 'free' the South African economy up for creating further employment, should it come to national power. Mr Trollip's address also touched upon the upcoming municipal elections and the urgent need for Bishops students eligible to vote to register, while for those still too young, to encourage older family members to ensure they cast their ballots. Although Mr Trollip acknowledged he was communicating his party's views, his address was nevertheless most informative for our boys' who were clearly anxious to be informed on current South African political issues. The next History Society meeting is due to be held on 8 March where Professor Milton Shain of the UCT History Department will speak on "Making Sense of Israel and Palestine". A report dealing with this presentation will be covered in a future DC Magazine. Rodney Warwick

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The 1st X1 completed a superb year by continuing their good form from the first term into the fourth term. The second half of the year began with the annual Cape Schools Week, hosted this year by Wynberg. Unfortunately this event was badly affected by rain and we only managed to complete 2 matches out of the five. We had a very boring draw against Selborne and then beat Union HS easily by 9 wickets before coming up against Grey in a 20/20 fixture at Newlands. Having restricted Grey to a meagre 126, the rain came down and that was the end of the week for us. We had easy wins over Somerset College and SACS in day/night fixtures before the most exciting match of the year against Paul Roos. Having bowled a strong Paul Roos team out for 108 on a seamer-friendly pitch, we soon found ourselves in heaps of trouble at 17/5 and 34/6. A solid partnership between **Luke Jacobs** and **Nikolai Smith** followed before Nikolai got out at 62/7 and **Jamie Strang** joined Luke. They crawled to 92 before Luke hit a long hop straight at mid wicket and we were soon 102/9. **Jamie Strang** then swung lustily and managed to get two balls away to third man for four to clinch a memorable and gutsy victory — our first over Paul Roos since 2006. An extremely dull draw against SACS (hugely in our favour) was followed by a narrow two wicket

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loss to a Wynberg team containing as many as 9 WP players. We competed all the way and the match could just as easily have gone our way after we posted a competitive 206/6. Easy wins over Stellenberg and Bergvliet followed before the curtain came down on our season with an emphatic 7 wicket win over Rondebosch after our two opening bowlers **Jamie Strang** and **Nikolai Smith** (with 5 wickets each) demolished the Rondebosch batting line up for a meagre 58. This meant that the team finished the term with 7 wins, 2 draws, 1 loss and 1 match abandoned from their 11 matches played since September for an overall year record of 15 wins, 9 draws and three losses in the 29 completed matches they played during 2010. Two matches were abandoned due to rain.

Our batting never reached the heady heights of the first term when we regularly topped 200. But that was mainly because we bowled our opponents out for less than 125 on eight of the eleven occasions this term. Our batters scored just two half centuries between them - Martin Versfeld (88 vs SACS when asked the open the batting) and **Nikolai Smith** (71 in just 41 balls vs Bergyliet in a display of power hitting which we look forward to seeing more of next year). We got home invariably through a team batting effort with lots of players chipping in with twenties and thirties. The most important of these came from **Luke Jacobs** and **Jamie Strang** who both scored match-winning twenties against Paul Roos under great pressure. **Richard Tissiman** got a good 35* against Stellenberg and will again be one of our front line batters next year while **Ramsay Collins** opened the batting against Wynberg following the withdrawal of **Paul Kuiper** from cricket due to exam pressures and scored a fighting 41 against one of the best attacks around. **Seb Golding** and **James Crowson** who dominated completely in the first term when they 'printed' runs both struggled a bit more this term, but still chipped in with a couple of 30's and 40's each. It is always a sign of a quality player if he can get 30 although not really in top form. When someone at the top of the order does not get fifty, it always means that one scores more slowly because batters never really dominate until they get over fifty. That said, we were often chasing low scores and so big individual contributions were not required. The rather greener and slower wickets this term (as a result of the unseasonal rain) made batting that much more difficult. Our bowling exploited this and Jamie Strang had a sensational term with the ball knocking over the top order on nearly every occasion and passing fifty wickets for the year in so doing. Jamie (who earned his 50th cap for the 1st X1 in the final match against Rondebosch) has developed real pace and extracts a lot of bounce because of his height - making him a difficult prospect for batters. He received good support from William Rosenberg who bowled his seamers particularly well in the early part of the term and ended with 86 career wickets at the end of a distinguished career spanning 75 matches for the 1st X1. And also from **Nikolai Smith** who developed far more control this term and was able to keep the pressure on from both ends. His 5 wicket haul against Rondebosch should give him momentum going into next year. Our spinners did not get to bowl nearly as much as usual because our seam attack invariably had done the job by then, but **James Crowson** bowled some more really tight spells and **Digby Harding** and **Seb Gold**ing both chipped in. Digby and Seb will spearhead our spin attack next year and both have now had plenty of experience and should have little trouble stepping up to the plate.

Our fielding was not up to the very high standard we set in the first term, but was still better than most of our opponents. We did drop too many crucial catches (especially of opponents' top 38 College March 2011

batters) which put us under some pressure. And we sometimes allowed our ground fielding to let us down too. **Kyle Jacobs** made good strides as a young 'keeper playing in his grade 10 year in the 1st X1. He has great hands and just needs to work on his leg-side takes to become a class act. Considering that the team spends many hours practising their fielding and that they love this aspect of the game and take great pride in it, it was disappointing that we did not always maintain our standards. One of the reasons was lack of focus in matches which they knew we had already 'sewn up' and one can at least understand this - even if it doesn't sweeten the blow!

James Crowson had a quiet, confident air as a captain who never got flustered under pressure and invariably led from the front by bowling when it was tough or standing tall with the bat when it was most needed. He has a real feel for the game and made some important and inspirational bowling changes.

I would like to conclude by thanking every single player for putting themselves on the line whenever they played, and for so obviously having great pride in their performance and such passion for the baggy blue. Your behaviour on and off the field was also outstanding and you certainly made Bishops proud this year.

Our scorer **Dee Ferrandi** needs special mention. Dee is such an integral part of the 1st X1. He does so much more than just score. He writes a weekly report for the wpsport website, he comes to practices to feed the bowling machine, he helps with fielding warm ups and he lives every over with the team. I would like to thank him for his fantastic contribution to the 1st X1. His is really a case of service before self and I know the players are really grateful for what he does for them.

Richard Smith was a fantastic help to me and to the team this year. His understanding of boys and the intensity of his fielding sessions have stood out for me – even more than the 9 million balls he has thrown at our batters. I know the boys have enjoyed working with him enormously.

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ROWING



September signaled the start of the 2010/2011 rowing season as the Bishops rowers headed off to Elgin for their first camp. Under the guidance of the new Head Coach, Samuel Wells, the oarsmen began their serious training for the next 5 months. Samuel Wells is an Andrean (St Andrews) and after completing his university studies at Rhodes he spent a number of years rowing and coaching in the UK. His biography boasts many national and international successes, both personally and

as a coach. With his tremendous amount of experience, passion and dedication to the sport, Bishops Rowing is proud to have him lead our oarsmen to new heights. **Oscar Horstmann** entered his second rowing season as MIC and together with Samuel and **Dane Wilson**, the Captain of Rowing for 2010 -2011, they have led our oarsmen into this season with great success.

The Bishops Regatta at Zeekoevlei, the first event on the calendar, dawned a perfect rowing morning. Every Bishops rower got to race at least once ensuring a firm second overall place as Bishops walked away with 4 first place finishes, 4 seconds and 5 thirds. The 1st 8+ was a great final race incorporating old boys from SACS and Bishops with the last season's SACS boat taking the glory. The following weekend they were off to the Knysna Regatta. Ollie Husband comfortably won the Open sculls and the U16 8+s were uncontested. Bishops entered three 8+ crews, a first for the club, for the Head's Race and Bishops 1st VIII finished a very close third. Misverstand continued the run of perfect rowing weather the following weekend as once again the three Bishops 8+ crews took to the water for the 6.2 km Heads Race. SACS took gold over Bishops 1st VIII but only by 3.1 seconds. After the grueling grade 11 exams and Epic, the 8+ arrived to conquer the mighty Kowie River in Port Alfred at Boat Race. Although they were well prepared, training as close to race times as possible, acquainting themselves with river currents and sandbanks, visualizing every part of the race and eating well it seemed that the break in their training took its toll. Race day arrived and the river was restless with wind and rain. The results were not as good as they had hoped for but the week's experience of tough competition and camaraderie was worth every moment and although they were disappointed with their results they remained in good spirits. The January camp at Robertson prepared our oarsmen for the sprint season and at the first regatta, hosted by SACS at Elgin, **Jason Liddiard** won the u15 scull final and the U16 VIII (Dry) took gold as did the U16B IV (Nyati). In the U19 division **James Johnston**, back from exchange, glided to victory in his scull, Scholtz and Wilson won the pair and the 4+, stroked by Husband, were able to accept a magnificent new trophy. The Rondebosch regatta sadly fell on the same day as the Bishops Sports Day and the River Vaal Regatta so that only a limited number of oarsmen represented Bishops. Although the day got off to a good start, the wind got up forcing the last few races to be cancelled. Scholtz traveled up to Gauteng with **Samuel Wells** to take part in the River Vaal Regatta that was held at Roodeplaat Dam because the Vaal was flooding. Bishops does not get the opportunity to row in many big national regattas and the exposure was invaluable for these two oarsmen. They

both did extremely well against the tough competition, proving themselves as capable scullers. Dane reached the quarterfinals B sculls event and in a hard fought race over 1500m the pair lost the semifinal to St John's who went on to win in the final. At the Somerset Regatta the Opens took the glory in all their events barring the eights as did the U16 VIII, VI and the Dry and De Freitas pair. Then they were off to East London for the Buffalo and Selborne Regattas. On the overcast humid Thursday the heats took place for the Buffalo regatta seeing many of the Bishops crews making the finals with ease in all age groups. The Selborne Sprints over 500m presented cooler conditions for a long and tiring day with both heats and finals. In the U15 age group Jason Liddiard came second in the A final and Grant Soll slotted into 5th position in the B final as did the quad (Soll). The B4x (Sellier) came third. The U16 VIII (Dry) came a close second and the A4+ (Hanekom) and the B4+ (Nyati) both collected gold medals at the prize giving ceremony. Although the open four came in 5th in their heat with a time of 1.38.8, St Andrews won with a time of 1.35.4 demonstrating how tight this race was for 6 boats. James Johnston achieved 4th place in his scull, while the open pair (Scholtz/ Wilson) and open double (Johnston/Husband) got seconds. The 8+ finished 5th in the B final. With much anticipation and excitement Saturday dawned a hot day for the Buffalo finals. Rowing like rockstars, James Johnston and Ollie Husband took all the glory in the open doubles as did the, now unbeaten over 2000m, U16 VIII, stroked by James Dry. James Johnston (Open) and Jason Liddiard (U15) snapped up second positions in their sculls as did the under 16A4+, stroked by Hanekom, while a third was collected by **Grant Soll** in the U15B1x. It was a long and tiring three days for all but there will be little rest for our oarsmen as they prepare for SA Champs in two weeks time.

Fedde Van den Bosch was once again the adjudicator and was presented with a Bishops Shooting shirt and a sun hat in recognition for the valuable varied assistance he renders to our shooting. During the fourth term our shottists challenged SACS and in a very tight competition our opponents edged us out by only three points (715 to 712). Wouter and **Max Giardini** were recently able to experience the specialised discipline of long range shooting, courtesy of facilitation by Wouter's father Mr Theuns Kuhn and Mr Tinus Brits of the SA Bisley Association. Wouter shot 42/50 at 500m and Max 30/50 at 600m. It is intended the squad members will towards the end of the term also enjoy the regular firearms shooting afternoon at False Bay Gun Club where they are able to use different forms of military-style and civilian weapons. 

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HEADMASTER'S REPORT



GRADE 7 LEAVERS' DINNER 2010

Thank you to Xander Gowar (tonight's Master of Ceremonies), Sozon Sarandis, Stefan Ranoszek and Nicholas Ryall and all the boys who have spoken this evening. Thank you to Lynne Adelbert for the programme and for the coaching she and Sandee Clapperton have given the boys for tonight. Well done to you all.

Thank you too to the Grade 7 parents for the organisation of this dinner and for your support throughout the year. The boys will thank Gerianne Thomson

and her Committee later in the programme but I wish to add my personal thanks: you have given us a spectacular evening and it has been a great pleasure to work with you.

One of the defining characteristics of this class this year has been that of fellowship. Earlier in the week the Grade 7s voted for the Williamson Fellowship Trophy, a trophy where they choose the best Fellow of the Year: their choice this year is Den Fairall. Congratulations, Den.

There are a number of special moments that stand out for me with regards to the 2010 Grade 7 class: amusing, gutsy and inspiring. There are many and I will not be able to mention them all nor each boy, but here are a few:

- Aidan Bizony as one of the waterpolo scorers. Aidan is a lot more competitive than people know. So when I used to go up to the table to ask how the game was going there were only 2 types of reply. If Bishops was winning, it was "We're creaming them." But if we were losing he would pretend not to hear me and there would be no reply. This competitiveness went quite far though: he would often conveniently forget to record certain goals scored by the opposition so his scoring tallies had to be carefully watched.
- The 1st XV's game against Highbury at the Durban Prep Rugby Festival in the second term. They played very poorly in the first half even though they were the better team. They were losing badly by half time and I don't know what Mr Fogarty said to them during the break but they came back and played like demons, in the second half and went on to narrowly lose the game.
- The audio-visual team, super-efficient, and Nic Ryall doing a 100m sprint to fetch the laptop when he realised we were singing a hymn and the Anthem at Final Assembly yesterday.
- Your wonderful robotics display and demonstration in Jagger Hall.
- 54 boys out of 78 playing at the Leavers' Music Concert and 5 of you being awarded certificates for representing the school at First Team level in four sports or more; of course there are also many who have played in the First Team level for one or two or three sports.

• I have been very impressed with the Student Council this year under Stefan Ranoszek's chairmanship. While they failed to get cell phones and cell phone lockers for boys at the school (despite an enormous amount of work and motivation from Matthew Morris), they did get to stage "Bishops Got Talent". Designed to generate funds for their Outreach drive, the Homestead Street Children's Project, they came up with this idea of organising and running a talent show. Boys were invited to audition, the judges selected a final 10 who performed for the school and they judged the winner (a Grade 6: definitely unbiased judging!). No teachers were allowed to help them, they organised everything, audio-visual, backstage, ushers, etc. My job was just to contain them and keep their feet on the ground. Their planning started with a 1 000 strong audience in the Mallet Centre, then they decided on the Memorial Theatre, but finally it came to an 11h00 concert in Jagger Hall. It was a great success and a real example of "pupil power".

- Some of the Council members ended up being extremely amusing themselves at "Bishops' Got Talent" (for me at least): Ross "sideburns" Willis as MC who stopped just short of his own song-and-dance routine, and the judges, Lucas (Janssens), Xands (Gowar), Daks (Date Chong) and Stefan, all wearing very cool shades at one stage in the proceedings and admitting to me that they couldn't see much but that it was part of the look.
- Then the "cafe" brigade, those boys who learnt deftly to use thumb and forefinger to sweep their fringes out of their eyes, especially when a teacher approached. Sozon, Stefan Olbrich, Cornel "my girlfriend likes straight hair" Smit, James Ross, are a few. I hope Mr Wood will catch this group early next year.
- Of course, a comment on 2010 would not be complete without mentioning "Seussical, the Musical". You Grade 7s really embraced this, flocking in droves to auditions, and a huge number of you became involved either on stage or in a backstage capacity. There was a strong motivation apart from the arts, and that was the presence of so many from Springfield, Herschel and St Cyprians. While the pupils were having a great time, Mrs Sheard was not. She could not understand the constant hugging or sitting on one another's laps. So she banned both activities and allowed only the shaking of hands or a "high five" between boys and girls. I am not sure how successful that instruction was! But in the midst of all this you did learn to act and sing, and how well you did that. A number of new reputations were earned during the course of the production; many earned the reputations as ladies' men, not least of all our Head Boy, Michael Thomson, a muscleman, Piers Johnstone, and friend to all pretty girls, James Ross.

So many of you sitting here made Seussical the success it was and it will remain an indelible part of your Grade 7 year. Well done. Your teachers have enjoyed teaching and interacting with you, both as individuals and as a group. We have spoken casually amongst ourselves a number of times about what it is that has made you a real pleasure to work with. And it is important to try to identify what it is especially for you boys, because positive feedback is not there to

make you feel big-headed or invincible but rather to make you aware of those characteristics of yours that you must never lose. On reflection, I think it is the really open, engaging and friendly manner that you have with everyone: peers, teachers and other adults. It is not something that I see with every group of boys: with you it stands out. And it became so clear to me in the first term and then again this term and both instances were relayed to me by Mr Michael Keale, who is one of our special guests tonight. Michael has been a friend of the school since the mid-90s when he retired from headmastering in the UK (he headed three schools in his career) and started spending a few months of the year in Cape Town. He is a great supporter of the 1st Cricket XI at the Prep and has hardly missed a game during the time he has spent in Cape Town over the last fifteen years. Discussing the team with me in February, he told me that it was the friendliest group he had ever encountered at the Prep. They always made him feel especially welcome, thanked him for coming and spontaneously offered him tea and so on. When I saw him two weeks ago he told me that he was so pleased by something that had happened at the Wynberg match the previous week. I don't think people knew that he had arrived from the UK again, but he always receives a copy of our calendar and so arrived at the game. With two winter terms since their last contact with Michael, and under no instruction from their coach, they all came across to him, shook hands and welcomed him. To hear this always makes teachers and parents proud. But it's not limited to just this team.

As parents will know especially, boys tend, when asked how things are going, to say "fine", or if asked about the progress of a match, to give the briefest answer possible. You boys, however, actually tell us what is happening. You look us in the eye, talk freely and naturally, remaining respectful but connecting with us, answering a real question in a real way. Similarly you will often come over, as has happened with Mr Keale, to talk about events or ask how we are. This is a great attribute.

It has extended to your peers as well. We have seen wonderful support from you for others in your grade who have gone through difficult times. Last year there were some difficulties among you with nastiness to certain boys but you have moved on from that and there has hardly been such an incident this year.

Michael Thomson has stood tall as Head Boy – always caring for others and encouraging them. You have done a great job, Michael. Well done.

I saw this support for each other and even for boys in other grades in "Bishops' Got Talent". A boy rushed off crying during his audition when he lost his nerve and two Grade 7s ran after him, consoled him and persuaded him to try again. In the same way when boys made mistakes or missed the beat in their songs on the day, you shouted encouragement, "it's okay", and "go on". Again, great to see.

However, I don't want Mr Wood to think that he is receiving 76 angels next year. There is also a fair amount of devilment in this group. Our Head Boy, whom I praised earlier, when doing a presentation on the group's trip to Hong Kong for the International Maths Competition at assembly, saw fit to show us a picture of an unmentionable part of a bull's anatomy and to explain that it is a delicacy in Eastern cuisine. Try correcting someone like Marco Comitis for long hair or the messiest corner in a classroom and he doesn't lose his smile or the twinkle in his eye when he answers you. And you heard the comments in their speeches: very charming when in trouble or they want a movie instead of a serious lesson.

But seriously, we have enjoyed you immensely and I know you have enjoyed this year, putting in

a lot and taking much satisfaction and enjoyment out.

It's so easy to act dutiful and respectful by being impeccably well-mannered, jumping up, "yes sir", "no sir". But the real respect, the openness, the welcome, comes from within. We have seen a genuineness within you which we hope you will always have.

Never lose the ability to connect with people, to care for others, to engage openly, making others feel welcome and affirmed. It is a great gift and one of the key values of Bishops that you are using well – never lose it because some people do not value it or insult you for it. Always remember: "A person is a person, no matter how small."

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

PRIZEGIVING 2010

Professor Geoff Everingham, Grant Nupen, special guests, parents, staff and boys.

I wish to thank Geoff for his support of me as Head of the Prep, for his wise leadership of Council and his overriding interest in the school and its growth.

Thank you for being with us today as we reflect on and celebrate a year that has been packed with so many events and projects: as a country we had the World Cup and as Capetonians our fabulous stadium and unforgettable Fan Walk; as a school we have had our own inter-class Soccer World Cup mania and the second Grade 7 tour, to the Eastern Cape this time, Seussical: the Musical, Bishops Got Talent, the Cape Schools' Cricket Festival, for which we were the hosts, and through all this a great deal of teaching, learning and growth. It has passed so quickly – it is hard to believe that the Grade 2s of 2009 will move to Grade 4 in the new year.

On a lighter note, I turned 50 this year, and while I do not feel any lighter the occasion elicited some interesting responses. The PA and staff organised a slide show for assembly which included a number of photographs. Some were less than suitable; never a good idea to show one's pupils at their impressionable ages photographs of one's student days. Many classes had prepared cards for me, particularly those in the lower grades. While most congratulated me on being halfway to 100, Josh in 3B wished me "Happy 50th Mr Brown, don't retire now". In Grade R, Dieter wished "many presents for me and all the skateboards in the world".

Our boys have achieved an impressive number of selections for regional and provincial teams in sport, Honours and Distinctions for Music, Eisteddfods and external exams as well as a number of awards and high rankings in academic events such as Olympia. I want to use this opportunity to mention one such area and that is Maths. You will see on the programme the number of our boys who did very well in the AMESA Maths Olympiad as well as the Living Maths Olympiad. Three of our Grade 7s were selected for the Cape Town team that participated in the International Primary Maths Competition in Hong Kong and Korea: Michael Thomson, Alex Green and Soo-Min Lee. Soo-Min Lee was also first in the Living Maths Competition and a close second in the South African Maths Olympiad, both at Grade 9 level, an outstanding achievement for a boy in Grade 7.

The appointment of Marileen Harrod as Learning Support Co-Ordinator at the start of this year has brought an important part of the Next Wave vision, namely to increase the role of the Bishops Support Unit across all areas of the school, to fruition. An Educational Psychologist and former teacher, Marileen has brought us her considerable expertise after working in a number of schools and running a private practice. Through this position we are able to much more successfully manage and monitor learning support from Grades R to 7. Marileen has already effected a number of changes. All in all this is a very exciting development for the school.

We were happy to welcome four new staff members in January: Caron Cale in Grade R, Lindy van Stormbroek in Grade 2, Andrew Caldwell in Grade 6 and Caron Thomas in the front office. Angie Booth retires as Housemother of Van der Byl House at the end of the year and we wish her well with her future plans. Jill Jones, who has taught here in Grade 2 and 3 for more than a decade, has decided to leave full time teaching at the end of the first term next year. We thank her for her contribution and wish her well.

One of the things that sets us apart from other schools in Cape Town is our boarding facility. We are the only boys' school to offer weekly and termly boarding on the scale that we do. While some of the other schools do have boarders it is for far smaller numbers and only on a weekly basis. There was a time (and it is not too long ago) when the Prep had two boarding houses (Bramley and Van der Bijl, formerly Birt) making about 25% of the Prep boys boarders but we are now at about 8% (32 boys). This is still reasonable although the aim is to have the House full at 40. Boarding is important as an opportunity for boys from other countries and other parts of South Africa to benefit from a Bishops education. It also adds to the dynamic of the school allowing an international flavour as well as an urban-rural mix. The boarding house system is also at the heart of the House system; the House system as we knew it grew out of boarding schools. Boarding is a great experience in itself and many boys who start boarding never want to exchange it for the day boy life again. It gives scope for new friendships, camaraderie, a ready rugby or soccer team at any stage and structure – something that boys, although they might fight against it, love. So, while we actively recruit boarders, I would encourage local families to also consider boarding for their sons in the higher grades in the Prep. Many of our boys go on to board at College from Grade 8 and Prep boarding is a good preparation.

We continue to plan for and implement improvements to the physical infrastructure of the Prep and Pre-Prep. We were very fortunate this year to have received the donation of installed artificial turf surfaces for the Grade 1 and 2 playgrounds from a Grade 1 parent and OD, Brent Dyssell, for which we are extremely grateful. A donation from the Tyers-Stempel family intended for art teaching facilities will be used in 2011 to revamp the Pre-Prep art room.

As part of the Masterplan, a team of architects has also provided us with a design framework for the improvement of the Prep grounds and play area layout as well as Jagger Hall, and somewhat more ambitiously, at the Pre-Prep, provision for a library, music room and stand-alone after-care centre. These are all both desirable and necessary but implementation will always depend on the availability of finances and careful planning but we hope to see a gradual roll out of these plans over the next few years.

On the communications front, and I know there never seems to be too much of this these days, there are also a number of developments. IT staff are designing a new portal for the school which will enable My Bishops Life to be extended right through the school. Those of you who have boys at the College will already know the value of this – it is essentially a site providing all the information pertinent to your son's life at Bishops: marks from assessments, discipline and rewards, sports teams, etc, accessible through a parent's unique password. We will also implement Bishops in Contact next year: one of those blocks that pops up on your computer screen giving the school day's calendar and with links to news and further details of events. It will also connect to your cellphone if you wish to have that service.

It is impossible to reflect on 2010 at the Prep without referring to our production of Seussical: the Musical. It is so easy these days to comment that standards are dropping in education even in the best schools. But as a member of Council remarked, one had to see this production to realise how incredibly high the bar actually is. This was a superb production in every respect: vibrant music, a huge cast and range of characters, larger than life sets and colourful props to capture the adventures of Dr Seuss, exciting dancing and so much more. Audiences over five nights were treated to a real "celebration of life".

The musical dealt with the disregard of the large and powerful for the small and weak and the exceptions to the rule which there always are. One of the abiding refrains from Suessical is "A person is a person no matter how small " and I think these words reflect in short what has stood out for me about this year's Grade 7 class. Not only did they play a leading role in Seussical but they lived many of its lessons.

This Grade 7 class has impressed us with their support for others, their friendliness, their open and engaging manner and their honest connections and interactions with others. In some ways these are small things but in another these characteristics are the most vital to carry with one. And I encourage them to keep what they have developed as a group with them always. Care and respect for others and genuine friendliness to all, big or small, young or old, important or less so, will always set you apart, and define you in the very best way. It has been good to work with you, to see you grow, and you leave the Prep now with our very best wishes. Each one of you is going to College: make the most of the wonderful opportunities it offers.

Parents, we need to thank you, not only for entrusting your sons to our care, but for the support you have given over the year: as Class Reps, on the Parents' Association Committee, providing transport for matches and outings, flowers for the foyer, assistance in the library, running the Second Hand Uniform shop and in so many more areas. Without this we would not be fully what we are.

Thank you to our staff at the Pre-Prep and Prep: academic, administrative and support. A great deal is asked of you and you give it with great passion and inspiration. Thank you too, to my wife Lynne, who makes our home, Stanmore Cottage, regularly open to the broader Bishops family, and participates so much in the life of the school.

2010 has been an exciting and rewarding school year: may God continue to guide us in all we do and try to achieve.



The term began in the usual busy fashion with a meeting to finalise our new baseline assessment programme at grade R, which is designed to give us a better understanding of where the boys are with regards to their ability and understanding across a number of areas. With 72 boys beginning school from a variety of schools, it is always challenging to ensure that one is teaching to the needs, and with this programme the teachers will be in a better position early on to include activities within the classroom that will be specific to certain areas requiring exposure or stimulation.

At our 'Coffee and Muffin' morning we were fortunate to have Sam Vos from U Turn address a small group of parents around their philosophy and practice of assisting those who

are begging on the streets. The Pre-Prep have agreed to sell vouchers on behalf of U Turn to those parents who feel they would like to assist, but aren't sure how to do so. U Turn makes use of these funds to assist the selected individuals to re-establish themselves within society

through training and support. The vouchers cost R20 for 5 and one of these entitles the recipient to either food or clothing. U Turn works in tandem with many of the night shelters.

The level of questioning was quite challenging and considering these boys were all entered as individuals – they really excelled – well done!

During the term, our grade 1 and 2 boys joined the whole school in the Mallet Centre for Bishops Praise. Fr Terry and Mike Hampton met with all the boys across the school on a regular basis. Our final chapel service was held on break up





OBITUARIES



SELFE. John Henry Selfe died on 25 January 2011, aged 90, after a short illness. He was at Bishops from 1930-38. John was born in Bonnievale on 9 July 1920, the elder brother of Herby and Frances. He came to Bishops Prep as a boarder in Stanmore in Std 3. He finished VIth form in 1938, and was a house prefect in Founders, playing First XV rugby and was part of the cross-country and shooting teams. He went up to Oxford in September 1939 just in time for the outbreak of World War II, but completed the first year of his degree before returning to South Africa in June 1940 to sign up. His return trip was on a troop ship carrying hundreds of men – and a handful of women – one of whom was Thelma, his future wife. Miraculously they met and

connected, and thus began a wonderful partnership that would last for over 70 years.

He fought in various armoured units, but for the longest period in the Natal Mounted Rifles, in Abyssinia, North Africa (narrowly missing being captured in Tobruk) and Italy. Shortly after the end of the war in Europe, he managed to get on a flight from Italy to England to assist with the repatriation of POWs, and was thus able both to marry our mother, and to recommence his interrupted studies at Oxford. He graduated from University in June 1948 and returned to South Africa, where he joined the Department of External (later Foreign) Affairs. He was an economist by training, and was very soon employed in representing South Africa at multilateral conferences developing the General Agreements on Tariffs and Trade, protecting and expanding our trading relationships, and repairing the shattered economies of the post-war world. In a career spanning 33 years, he was posted to Cologne, London, Geneva, Taipei and Athens, in addition to the role he played as the representative of the Department of Foreign Affairs on the Prime Minister's Economic Advisory Council, and as a representative of South Africa in dozens of sessions of the United Nations and its specialist agencies in New York and other cities throughout the world. He retired as Ambassador to Greece, and the Greek

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government awarded him the Grand Order of Honour – a fitting tribute to a consummately professional diplomat. On his "retirement" he started his second career, as Director of the Bishops Trust, a task he took on with skill and zeal. Bishops played a huge role in his life, and particularly the values of integrity, fair play, self-discipline and insistence on excellence that he had been taught while at school. He was determined that the advantages he had enjoyed at Bishops should be available to new generations facing more complex challenges, and that they should do so grounded in these same values. He also followed the activities of the OD Union, of which he was a proud Vice-President, with keen interest. Only when he was abroad or, in latter years when he gave up going out in the evening, did he miss an OD AGM or OD dinner. In his spare time, he indulged in his passions: sport (virtually in any shape or form – even motor racing – as an avid armchair spectator), philately (his stamp collection was highly specialised, meticulously organised and world-class), and choral music. He had been a chorister (and in his final year, the Head Chorister) with Doc Brown, which resulted in Doc calling my brothers and me John Selfe I, II and III respectively. His other great passion was promoting the correct use of the English language. He was very involved in the South African Council for English Education, and bemoaned the appalling use of English and its mispronunciation in South Africa, particularly on the public broadcaster. His dispatches from abroad were detailed, incisive and wonderfully written. His interest in good grammatical language was not confined to English alone: he once made an entire speech in Greek without a note, and was complimented on the quality of the minutes he had taken, in Afrikaans, of a Cabinet meeting. When the cabinet minister asked him where he had learned this excellent Afrikaans, he replied cheekily - "At Bishops and Oxford".

He leaves Thelma, his wife of 65 years, daughter Helen, sons Andy (1960-68) and James (1963-73), eight grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Philip (1959-65) predeceased him. For all of us, his passing leaves a huge void, but we will be inspired by his example of putting others – and service – ahead of himself. We will miss him deeply. James Selfe

DE KOCK. Dr Servaas Thomas (Buzzie) de Kock died at home closely attended by his family in Hout Bay on 12 December 2010 aged 88. Born to Afrikaans parents he was only able to attend Bishops from 1938-39 before beginning his medical degree and then joining up with the SAAF in 1941. He served with no 4 squadron where he became an accomplished Spitfire pilot in North Africa and Italy, quickly reaching the rank of captain.

On his return he resumed his studies at UCT where he qualified as a doctor. He practiced as a GP, anaesthetist, obstetrician, geriatrics specialist and indeed 'psychologist' in Sea Point for all his adoring patients, young and old, whether they were able to pay or not. Whilst his career at Bishops may have been short and possibly unmemorable, especially to his maths teachers, he was most memorable thereafter. Although still very interested and proud of our Dutch ancestry, he loved the idea of Bishops and its 'Englishness', privileged culture and traditions. He was well aware of the status and connections it afforded and not least the considerateness and courtesy it punted. These were things which were definitely not taken for granted in his

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upbringing. Somehow he managed to extend this privilege of attending Bishops to us his four lucky sons, even though it brought much financial hardship at home.

It was no doubt also to temper our individuality and strong characters, irreverently coveted at our home in glorious Clifton. The best of both worlds! He was an above average aesthete, raconteur, philosopher politician, painter, poet, inventor and of course debater.

He had naturally in abundance what you cannot learn in any school; humour, intellect, class, taste and style. His duties as 'doctor' at Saturday rugby fixtures at Bishops amazingly meant no loss of personnel due to injury! For his four sons, going to Bishops was also to give us more of the opportunity he had, as it indeed has. To be at the Brooke Chapel for his memorial service was perfect and just as he wanted. To watch and listen as person after person, many unknown to us, stood up and eulogised him says it all. It was as deeply humbling for us as it would have been for him. What it told and reminded us was; that here was a man who had lived life on his own terms and yet had made so much of a difference in so may ways to so many different people.

Above all though, he was our Dad, difficult to live with and without - but definitely not boring! I hope we made him as proud as he has made us. We miss him.

DOLLERY. Austin Stuart Dollery died on 22 March 2010, a few weeks before his 84th birth-day. He was at Bishops from 1936-44. He was a gentleman in every sense of the word. Remembered by his daughters Helen and Marion, particularly for the enduring support he gave his family, for the sympathetic ear he unfailingly granted his daughters and for the sense of security he imbued in their home, he is sorely missed but, as Helen says, he has left a legacy that is worth remembering with joy. Blessed with a sharp, logical mind and a man who always honoured his commitments, Stuart was a good conversationalist who enjoyed company. When the family entertained, his resonant voice and joyous laughter would carry through his home. Helen tells that throughout her high school years he was her maths coach.

Stuart knew his limitations but also understood his strengths; no handyman, he did not hesitate to call in the experts when something needed repair - but lazy he was not, although, as age crept up on him and life made him tired, he claimed he was. In fact he continued to do his own admin work, with a little help from his daughter, right up until a couple of weeks from the end. As he was moved to the frail-care wing at Elphin Lodge, he insisted on helping with the move in a sensible manner and even sorted out the backlog of paperwork that had accrued. Determined to the point of stubbornness he nevertheless would acknowledge reason for change of mind and be open to it. Sometimes men short of physical stature feel they have to prove themselves - not Stuart; he never felt that he had to prove anything – his self-concept was strong; he kept his head high. An accomplished singer, he as a young man used to participate in light opera – Gilbert and Sullivan. He had a wonderful bass voice. He loved performing and music, singing in various choirs for much of his life. Part of the SABC choir in Johannesburg, he was also involved with the church choir and music groups until, in his mid-sixties, his voice gave out. Stuart was well-loved by many; he kept up life-long correspondence with friends,

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local and overseas, right up to the last; they would say of him: "...a very intelligent man, such a gentleman, who never grumbles at all."

He has, indeed, left a legacy that is worth remembering with joy. *Helen Lane*.

DE BRUYN. Patrick de Bruyn was born on 13 January 1937. He came to Bishops in 1950 and was in Founders House. He was an all round sportsman and played in the top rugby teams. After leaving school he went to Natal University where he studied for a BSc degree. After two years he decided that he wanted to farm. He attended Cedara Agricultural College where he studied for two years and then started farming. He married Carla soon afterwards. They had two children Michelle and Michael. He ran a very successful farming operation. He and Carla were very hospitable and generous hosts and had many friends. PETERSEN. David. 23 August 1931-16 November 2010. After a lengthy illness and an interesting life, he has come to rest.

He was a true gentleman, kind, considerate and unassuming, honourable, with a steadfast integrity and a commitment to excellence in everything he did. A family man, he was well read with a keen mind, a connoisseur of classical music and opera, an able pianist, always current on international affairs and economics, a gardener, chef, a scratch golfer, and a first string rugby player at university, a fisherman, nature and animal lover; he also had a wickedly dry sense of humour. He supported his family in every endeavour, and encouraged his sons to follow their dreams. Born in Cape Town, South Africa, to an old and prominent family, he was educated at Diocesan College (1940-48), where he played rugby and excelled at boxing. 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PETERSEN. David Peterson was at Bishops from 1940 to 1948. On the 16 November our dear David passed away after a period of ill-health which he bore quietly, without complaints and without fuss. To say this was typical of this brave man is to state the obvious for all those who knew him. David was marked by two qualities, unusual in themselves, but in combination they set him aside and above the herd: bravery and honesty. He never hesitated before a display of either quality nor did he have to weigh any selfish consequences as many of us mortals do. I have two examples to share with you. David and I went to the same school in Cape Town, South Africa. This was the Diocesan College, or Bishops, as it was commonly known. Some of those present today were also privileged to attend this school and will clearly remember the Headmaster of the Preparatory school. He was a remarkable Cambridge scholar, athlete and disciplinarian, always fair but unyielding in matters of decorum, as well as learning. One morning he gathered the school in the hall – perhaps 250-300, fearless, smiling young men, ranging in age from 8 to 14, and announced that he wished all who had decorated the newly whitewashed walls of the lavatories with crude remarks of one sort and another to come up to the platform, where he was standing, prior to being led to his study for a caning. There was a deathly, fearful, unsmiling silence apart from some nervous fidgeting and many sly sideways glimpses to see who would be foolhardy enough to own up. On this day David was not only among the younger boys but was also still small of stature. But this did not stop him from unhesitatingly marching up to the platform from the back of the hall. He was led out for his caning and returned to hear the plaudits of the Headmaster as he explained his admiration for the courage and honesty of this young boy, while a bunch of cowardly older boys were still thinking they would escape the punishment which awaited them – since he knew the names of those who were guilty and was prepared to wait all day for them to present themselves. It took a long time for these less brave boys to come forward. I doubt whether any who were there on this occasion, and I include myself, will ever forget the example set by David Petersen of unquestioning courage and honesty which I have every reason to believe were the hallmarks of the rest of his life.

David shone of course in other areas. He was unselfish, considerate, kind and compassionate. These were important attributes in his life's work of geology and mining. This life was often hard but gave David an outlet for his sense of fairness and his consideration for those who worked with him and with whom he shared the many hardships. (In Northwest Mexico these included bandidos, who were pleased enough with his self-taught Spanish to decide not to shoot him, as well as nocturnal visits by wild animals, such as lynx and cougars).

When the collapse of the financial support of a job left him and his men without pay, he paid them out of his own pocket rather than see these poor families starve.

TAYLOR. Jeremy (B.Sc. UCT. B.Sc. CompMed. UWC. B.CM. NAT.Cum Laude. UWC)

Jeremy was born premature on 13 September 1979 in Cape Town, South Africa and from the start he never took life for granted. Throughout his life he looked forward to, and embraced challenges and opportunities; he ensured that if the experience was to be had, he would have it. It was this outlook on life that the people who met him found so attractive and inspiring. Jeremy tragically passed away in an Aeroplane crash near Kathmandu, Nepal, on 24 August 2010 on his way to Mount Everest; his life was not unlived.

Starting his academic life at the age of three at Villa Maria,

Tamboerskloof, Jeremy moved onto Saint Stithians and finished his primary school education at Western Province. He was at Bishops from 1993-97. After a gap year in Europe, he applied to UCT where he was awarded a bursary to write a Bachelor of Science. In an attempted hijacking he was shot in the knee shortly before he was due to write his final exams but in spite of this he completed the year and was awarded his B.Sc. Due to the traumatic experience of the hijacking, his interests and focus changed from studying an MBChB in mainstream medicine to Natural and Alternative Medicines. This change in disciplines proved to be a move in his favour, which reflected in his academic performance. In 2006, Jeremy was invited to join the Golden Key International Honour Society. He graduated Cum Laude.

Jeremy enjoyed his post as a part-time lecturer at the University of Western Cape. In 2007 he opened his practice on Kloof Street, which, operating as a Naturopathic Clinic, specialised in trauma medicine and female hormone imbalances. It was at this practice that he created natural medicinal drops to cure certain ailments. It is with the income from these drops that he was able to put the practice on the backburner and pursue his love for travel. Whilst actively practising his Naturopothy, Jeremy was asked to sit on the advisory board in Parliament to consult on the important relationship between health and tourism in the Western Cape. Jeremy adopted a keen interest in community service during his school years. He was actively involved in First Aid and the St John's Ambulance. In 1995, he was awarded the coveted distinction tie whilst at Bishops for rescuing a child from treacherous waters in Hermanus. Whilst at University he joined the South African Red Cross Air Mercy Services (AMS) as well as the Vodacom and Nokia Rescue Helicopters. Due to his proficiency in the water and in trauma medicine he served as an emergency rescue swimmer. In 2007, Jeremy followed his enthusiasm for community service and, in conjunction with the Amy Biehl Children's Foundation, started

an after-school education programme which taught children from the township about HIV and AIDS in the community.

Jeremy was selected to stroke for the Western Province under 19 lst VIII rowing squad. Rowing, throughout his school career, was Jeremy's favourite sport. It is thus fitting that his interests lay in water sports. He was a keen surfer, swimmer and runner; completing the Two Oceans Marathon just months after having been shot in the knee during the hijacking.

Jeremy recently discovered his passion for travelling. After establishing a passive income stream, he set his sights on the world. Throughout 2009 he travelled around South America and he spent much of 2010, until 24 August, travelling around Asia. I was lucky enough to join him in Vietnam on a motorcycle trip where we spent a week completing a 1600 km adventure on 110 cc Hondas and subsequently discovering Burma together. It was on this trip that I truly felt that Jeremy was doing what excited him; there was not one moment where he felt that he had had enough and wanted an end to the madness (Monsoon season on a motorbike - I had many of these moments). He had planned to get to India via Burma and Nepal, and upon completing this trip, he had hoped to work in a clinic in Rajasthan for a few months before returning to Singapore and heading to the Philippines.

Jeremy was the second son in the family and leaves his Mother Marion, elder brother Mark (1995), sister Caitlyn and myself. For me, and the people he left behind, he was a brother but most of all a best friend. It was with Jeremy that those nights out were just that much more laughable or would leave you wondering, "How on earth did we end up there?!" Above all, Jeremy made sure he had fun in everything that he did and to be part of that was something that was invaluable in my life. It is with this in mind that I thank him. Jeremy Guy Taylor was cremated by his family on 14 December 2010, in a traditional Hindu ceremony along the banks of the Bagmati River in Kathmandu, Nepal.

"I am sorry I wrote such a long letter but I did not have the time to write a short one" is approximately what Abraham Lincoln is supposed to have said and I know just exactly what he meant (was it he who said it?) for I have been asked to write a short piece on Patrick Channing, a great teacher, a wonderful man and a close friend to many of us.

Patrick left Bishops for Springfield at the end of 1999 in Clive Watson's time, after teaching mathematics at the College for ten or so years. And now eleven years later, he is dead and we are all the poorer for it. He did not teach maths to those who found the subject easy but rather to those who struggled with it - in the beginning,

anyway. Under his guidance that would soon change and the lads would even find themselves enjoying the subject. His secret? He taught boys as much as he taught his subject and he made

maths a less complex matter. He was tough yet fair, persistent but understanding, patient yet demanding, a disciplinarian but a kind one. No wonder everyone wanted to be in his maths set!

Early in his career at Bishops, he promised to throw a recalcitrant miscreant out of his first floor classroom window; so intensely serious was he that no one doubted he would do it – and from that time on discipline was no problem in his class. But, as I say, Patrick taught the pupil and not only mathematics; he taught as brilliantly outside the classroom as he did in it. A really fine coach of cricket, far better than he would ever let on, he was just as good with his rugby. In his teams his players learned to be sportsmen in the old-fashioned sense of the word – and they loved their games (as they did Patrick).

When he resigned from the College to teach at Springfield (where he was loved just as much), he also resigned from that once traditional haunt of Bishops' masters, the Olympic Sports Club. On his death, the members of the Club insisted that in spirit he had not left the Club at all and so in his honour the Olympic flag was dropped to half-mast, as has been done on so many other occasions for so many other fine Bishops' masters (and ODs) over the past hundred and more years.



Mike Walker (1948-57) has recently donated two of his books books to the ODU for the Library. Titles: Muizenberg – a forgotten story and A statement in Stone a beautiful book with architectural pictures of Muizenberg, St James and Kalk Bay houses. Architect, Luke Scott (1987-90) thought it of great interest when he was in the office at the time.

The Making of Spud the Movie is a most fascinating book and features two ODs **Donovan** Marsh (1983-87) and **Ed Jordan** (1982-86).

The film Spud was written and directed by Donovan. The author of the original book John van de Ruit writes that 'critically, it was Donovan who finally told me what my book was about, which allowed him to settle on the

driving motif for the film. One word explained all: acceptance'. Many critics have written that Donovan has turned a 'mediocre book into a masterpiece'. We are sure that Mr Marsh's experiences in White House were a great source of inspiration.

The following articles should make you proud to be an OD!

Donovan Marsh put his memories of boarding at Bishops to good use when directing Spud.

"I had the best time of my life at Bishops. I'm hyperactive, so I need a million things to do and there is always a million




things to do at boarding school.

"I really did everything, plays, sports, it was wonderful," said Marsh.

So he knew he was the perfect person to direct the adaptation of John van der Ruit's best-seller. He lives in Joburg where he was born, but would like to return to Cape Town at some point. "It's kind of my evil master plan - to be so fabulously successful I could live anywhere I like. I've been working on it for 20 years and I haven't got it right yet," he says, all but rubbing his hands together. The 40-year-old originally wanted to become a psychiatrist or a doctor of some kind but watching a "making of" feature in Grade 11 opened up the world of film-making to him, "1 watched them doing it, and thought '1 could do that'. It made sense to me for the first time."

Marsh got into Medical school but changed to Wits drama school at the last minute, although studying drama and film didn't quite prepare him for the world of local film-making. What did teach him how it all works was diving headlong into the industry directing award-winning commercials, award-winning music videos, multi-camera TV shows like Gladiators

and Who Wants to be a Millioniaire? and short films. "TV drama is where I cut my teeth. I don't think you should consider directing a film until you've had your 100 hours of TV drama.

"It's such an unimmediate art. When you paint, you put the paint on the canvas and you see straight away that's working. "In filming everything's done in miniature and there's no way of seeing whether it's going to work. There's a lot of experimentation with the style of performance, this camera work and that lighting. Only later, much later in the edit suite, you get the effect." For Spud he worked closely with editor Megan Gill, who worked on Tsotsi and Wolverine: "Every single frame and second is mine. It's my vision and I have a clear sense of how it needed to be cut."

Marsh believes directing is the most completely challenging thing he could have done as it involves every aspect of your personality. "It's very cerebral, very emotional, you've got to connect well with people, be able to be alone and to write - and you've got to be

able to be critical." While directing films in this country may be a "tough ask" he's optimistic about the industry's future. Through his TV show Class Act he wants to create stars and the kind of films audiences actually want to see. "Just to create a bit of vibe here so that we can get bums on seats and actually have a vibrant South African film industry. I'm very passionate about that."

He first heard about Spud being turned into a film when he read a newspaper article about producer Ross Garland raising the money and looking for an international director.'

"I thought 'here's an opportunity, here's something that's popular; it's exactly the kind of

movie this industry needs'. It fitted everything that I imagined a South African movie could be." He called Garland, who was initially cool. "He treated me a bit like a Seventh Day Adventist that comes knocking at the door.' Marsh remembers. He sent Garland his show reel (the 2005 drama Dollars and White Pipes). "He phoned me back, to his credit, and he said 'I'm really impressed ... but we're still looking for an international director."


Since Marsh had also offered his services as script editor, Ross called him a month later, because Van de Ruit was too busy writing another book to do the screenplay. So Marsh started on the screenplay and six months later was offered the director's chair.'

That was three years ago. Filming took place in April at private boys' school Michaelhouse in KwaZulu-Natal, where the books are set. While the school was initially dubious about allowing the filming there - since the books aren't exactly the best advert for the school - the headmaster was on their side. He helped to persuade the school board that the story was about a particular point in history, not a current reflection. Marsh chose to emphasise the underlying themes of Spud over what could have been a stronger narrative of a boy who needs to teach a bully a lesson.

"The film's moving as well as being funny. The funniness is just there as a layer. It's actually about a boy growing up and finding acceptance among his peers and in himself. About friendship and understanding people and these things called girls and coming to a fuller maturity. "It's a much harder trick to pull and I suppose the through line that I created was one of acceptance." With Spud the filmmakers are hoping to leverage off the film's huge following, hitting a core audience who will hopefully spread the news via word of mouth. The film has cost a bomb. "It was very expensive to make. It's not just a R5 million or a R6m movie," said Marsh. "You'd have to ask the producers about the budget, but you know John Cleese is not cheap." (In fact R40m was the original planned budget figure bandied about). For the filmmakers to recoup their investment they either have to do something unheard of at the South African box office - make more money than Schuster - or sell it overseas. "I think the only way you could sell something overseas is if you put a John Cleese in it, which we've done. Now we actually have a shot. Having him there opens doors and I think we have a really nice chance of selling it to international markets." He's excited about the possibilities of starting a franchise, should this film take off. "Americans do it all the time. We'd have our own franchise and our own income coming in, uplifting the industry and paying our actors, and our producers and directors."

Ed Jordan and THE MUSIC

"No, John, you gotta think like a black guy. Hang behind the beat. Right now, you're rushing in front like a white guy." These instructions were given to John Cleese by Ed Jordan when they were recording a hip hop track called Big Boss for the film Spud. Jordan had taken on the triple role of putting together the soundtrack, supervising the music and writing the score. "I can see why they have different people in each role," he confessed. "It was hard work being the one-stop shop." Ed spent a year working on the project and said one of his highlights was working with Cleese, who plays the teacher Guv. The film opened on the same weekend as the latest Harry Potter movie and beat the British film cleanly at the box office at the time. Says Jordan of the experience: "One of the best moments of my life was when I got a phone call to help out John Cleese. He was staying somewhere in the Midlands where the film was

being shot and I had to go to him to record. "When I got there, I realised that he is tone deaf and can't sing. When I asked him about those Monty Python classics like Lumberjack, he answered: Miming, my boy; miming'."

As the writer of the score for the film, Jordan was tasked with writing six new songs and two hymns. The songs were based on the Oliver story. In one scene, Cleese's character has to sing a song akin to You've Got to Pick a Pocket or Two. Jordan decided to do a rap interpretation and has Cleese rapping: B.I.G. B 0 double S. Jordan said he loved working with the British actor, whom he found inspiring. One of Jordan's favourite stories is when he was chatting with Cleese in his garden in the Midlands when suddenly Jordan saw a stuffed bear holding a hydrangea. 'Aah," smiled Cleese. "I see you spotted Honey Bear. She loves the sun."

The next day Jordan returned to the house only to

find Honey Bear was no longer in the garden. On asking where the stuffed bear was, Cleese looked at Jordan as if he was stupid and said: "Sleeping, of course." It was just one in a series of experiences and learning curves that characterised the year that was Jordan's Spud. Putting together the soundtrack was also a fantastic experience for him. Called Spud the Soundtrack, the CD features 23 tracks of original South African music from the '80s, as well as original tracks written specifically for the film and excerpts from the score.

"I remember being in boarding school for the first time with all the big boys who shaved and the smell of Lifebuoy soap," Jordan recalls. "When I first got to Bishops in Standard six there was this fellow new boy who one day put on his takkies and ran all the way home to Somerset West. His parents brought him back a few days later. The next week I looked out the window and there was running across the field back to Somerset West." It was these and other memories of private school life in the '80s that inspired Jordan to write tracks such as Just One for the Boys, sung by Troye Sivan's lead character. "We have modified the track for downloads by the Twitter generation," Jordan said of it. But perhaps the most exciting parts of the soundtrack are the '80s artists, Petit Cheval, Via Afrika, The Psycho Reptiles, Mango Groove and Face2Face. The trip down memory lane for an '80s child is fantastic. And the original tracks are great, too.

The brief by the producers was only to have South African music because Spud is a South African film. And Jordan has done an excellent job capturing that amazing time for South African music. "The lesson I learnt from this experience is that you must go for it. I have done smaller music work on short films for William Kentridge, as well as songs for some of Darryl Roodt's films. But this was so exciting. In fact, the last time I was this excited was 20 years ago when my debut album was at No 1 on Radio 5," he says.

As some of you know, **Kevin Smuts** (1993-2005) is a member of an a cappella singing group called Perfect Score. They put on a show at On Broadway in Long Street from 22-23 November which was great evening of entertainment, packed to the brim with songs for all ages and music tastes. From Queen, Elvis and The Beatles, all the way through to Coldpplay, Muse and the Red Hot Chilli Peppers, not to mention some "Local is Lekker" tracks.

They have stepped it up another notch, this time with professional sound and lighting, and a stack of new songs.

FARMING

Not all ODs are viticulturists!

SANDVELD potato farmer **John Bergh** (1970-74) was recently featured in a newspaper article. He had spent the morning with the news reporter surveying his expansive northern Cedarberg farm, not far from Clanwilliam. The following interview was published.

"Yes, we do eat a lot of potatoes," John said. "Nicola is my favourite. Nothing else compares." Nicola, a yellow-fleshed Mediterranean variety of potato, is a "shy bearer", meaning it does not

provide great yields but offers great flavour. Bergh is the only farmer in the country producing the variety exclusively for Woolworths. Bergh likes to cook them unpeeled (all the goodness is in the skin, he says), halved and oven roasted with olive oil sprinkled with an olive and rosemary seasoning. "They are great for salads too," he added.

The farm Patrysvlei has been in the Bergh family for 190 years and the family lives in the original home, built in 1820. "My grandfather grew tomatoes and my father specialised in export fruit," he said. In 1975, when the farm got electricity, the Sandveld's sandy soil could be properly irrigated and they started farming potatoes. "We ploughed up lots of fynbos to make way for the potatoes," said Bergh, adding that the loose soil was ideal for harvesting the tubers. Potatoes are not season-specific and grow year-round. Today, the Sandveld is one of the coun-

try's prime potato-growing regions and Patrysvlei is one of the large potato producers in the area. A decade ago, however, things were not quite as rosy. The farmer discovered his conventional farming methods were no longer working. He was using far more fertilisers, chemicals and water - without the same results. The plants were unhealthy and the yields poor. The realisation that something was wrong led him on a new path. "It's all about the soil," said Bergh. "Through my journey of growing produce organically, I have taught myself biological farming." Biological farming is about the minimal use of synthetic pesticide and herbicides, a short rotation of crops and, most importantly, feeding the soil regularly with compost and other organic matter. On the farm, they have established large wormeries with various species of worms, which provide essential vermicompost and vermitea, the by-products of composting. The compost is dug into the soil and the vermitea is sprayed onto the plants weekly. Judging by the healthy plants and yields, it is clearly working. "We don't really understand all the detail of it. It is not an empirical science and a lot of scientists shoot the ideas down. But today our plants are more resistant to disease, our produce is better and, I'm sure, more nutritious - and we use less water than we did before," said Bergh.

Apart from the Nicola, they also grow a number of imported varieties of potatoes. Why? "For the specific taste they offer and, agronomically, their yield is far better than some of the local varieties. Potatoes vary greatly in their eating characteristics," he said. In South Africa, half the potato market is made up of the Mondial variety. "Mondial doesn't have a lot of flavour but is so popular because it looks very good. White and bright is king in this country," he said. I was curious to know why potatoes are not sold by variety, as they are in the UK.

"The South African consumer is not variety aware," Bergh said. "There is not sufficient education regarding different potatoes and their uses and the majority (of consumers) are not discerning." In a fairly recent initiative, all Patrysvlei potatoes are now labelled by variety and their uses. "I believe it is the retailer's responsibility to educate consumers by including the variety (and the uses) on the packaging," said Bergh.

OFF THE RADAR

Where is **Stuart Abbott** (1992-95)

STUART ABBOTT PLAYED IN NINE TESTS FOR ENGLAND and was part of Clive Woodward's 2003 World Cup-winning squad, but things could have been different had Rudolf





Straeuli made more of an effort to bring the midfielder back to South Africa.

'I chatted to Rudolf before that World Cup and he said I could play for the Emerging Boks and if I did well he'd consider picking me,' recalls Abbott. 'But he didn't offer me a contract or give me any guarantees. Maybe I would have come home if he had - who knows - but I'd also just signed a new two-year deal with Wasps and wanted to honour it'.

Abbott left Cape Town in 2001 after a couple of frustrating seasons with Western Province and the Stormers, where his progress was blocked by the likes of **Robbie Fleck**, De Wet Barry and Braam van Straaten.

'On the day I arrived in England it was pouring with rain, and I thought I'd made the biggest mistake of my life,' says Abbott with a laugh. 'Some people told me not to go but I signed an I8-month contract with Wasps and knew I could always come back if things didn't work out. Six months after my arrival, Warren Gatland and Shaun Edwards joined the club and when Warren went back to New Zealand he was replaced by Ian McGeechan. We were very successful under those coaches'.

Abbott was part of a Wasps team that won the Premiership three times and the European Cup twice, and in 2003 he was called up to the England squad. 'It was a shock, as I had only been in the country for 18 months,' he says. 'England had an established team at the time, but having seven or eight Wasps guys around helped me to settle in. 'It did feel strange to pull on an England jersey for the first time (against Wales in a World Cup warm-up match in Cardiff) but I really wanted to play international rugby and they gave me that opportunity.'

Abbott started England's World Cup pool games against Samoa and Uruguay, and came on as a substitute in the quarter-final against Wales. 'It would have been an amazing experience even if we hadn't won the World Cup but the fact that we did made it that much more special,' says Abbott, whose winner's medal is 'somewhere in a cupboard' at his new home in Green Point.

Abbott and his wife Megan (above right) returned to South Africa in July after getting

married in April and travelling through Europe and Asia for their honeymoon. 'I had a great time in England, but all our friends and family are here so we were always going to come back,' says Abbott. 'A year ago, I started a digital entertainment business that provides mobile applications throughout South Africa. You can check us out at www.amobi.co.za.

'It took me a while to get used to working a nine-to-five job; you don't realise how good you have it as a rugby player until you've retired (which Abbott did in October 2007 after suffering a string of injuries). But I'm really enjoying this new chapter of my life and it's great to have weekends off to go mountain biking or whatever else I feel like doing.'


Before returning to South Africa, Abbott was the backs coach at Rosslyn Park RFC (a third-division English club) and he'd like to stay involved in the game.

'At this stage, I can only coach on a part-time basis because of work commitments, so coaching a schools team once a week would be ideal,' he says. 'At some point, though, I may get involved with a club side like UCT'.

Daniel Vickerman (1987-96) PLAYED IN 55 TESTS FOR AUSTRALIA.

"Cambridge is cold. So cold it chills you to the bone. So cold that pitches freeze over, making play heavy and calling for a faster, harder style of rugby where night-time games are a matter of endurance. For an Aussie, used to hotter climes, that's a culture shock. I started playing rugby at the age of seven and never really aimed towards a professional career. From school tournaments I progressed to professional provincial teams in South Africa and Australia, and finally to selection for the Australian National side, who I played for from 2002 to 2008.

Balancing sport and work is, of course, an important and ever-present issue. Michaelmas Term is particularly intense in the lead up to the Varsity Match and you just have to do what you need to do to get the job done, whether it be preparing for a supervision or attending a training session. In a way, having two focuses sharpens the mind. One provides relief for the other, making life a little easier. There's no doubt that amateur rugby has a different feel to professional rugby. As a professional, rugby was my day job. I made some of my closest friends while playing full time, and the bonds that professional teams have are quite unique, but on a daily basis my routine was to do what needed to be done to play and win. Cambridge rugby is so much more well-rounded, which is refreshing, and it's a privilege to play with a group of guys from such diverse backgrounds. The culture of the Cambridge team goes much further than the field, it's a family atmosphere, a great bunch of guys who develop lifelong friendships, and being part of that is really very special. Whether amateur or professional, you've got to want to win. In the scrum you're just in there pushing and pushing, you're competing and you've got to want the victory. Inevitably the contest becomes personal but you've got to make sure that it doesn't cloud your judgement or the common team goal. Keeping your composure is essential but sometimes hard to achieve. You've got to know where to draw the line in the sand: ultimately the game's not about making yourself look good, it's about the team. Last year's Varsity victory was especially rewarding because, as team captain, I had seen I what the guys put in to make the season work. Watching the team improve and gel together was very pleasing. After a season plagued by injuries we came together when it really mattered, fielding



our full side for the first time at Twickenham. We played as a team with the common goal of winning. The season's predominantly about the journey, following the plan and executing it to the best of our abilities, but the win topped it all off.

Selection was, for me, the hardest process last year and I don't envy the new captain, Jimmy Richards, the task this season. It's amazing to see the joy and relief of players who make the cut. Others have played all season with total commitment and then aren't chosen due to injury. The disappointment is unbearrable. It's part of the captain's job, but my least favourite duty. Seeing the progress of the young guys was my favourite part. Watching them enjoy their rugby, make huge strides forward, achieve their goals and play to win was extremely rewarding. Being captain was a unique experience but I don't feel any sadness in passing the baton to Jimmy. The club is based on the principle that captaincy is one year long, you do your best, enjoy the

experience, and then someone else has a go. To be honest, not being captain won't change my role a lot: at the end of the day, I will play my best regardless, and I want to help make things go as well as possible. My hopes for the season are fairly straightforward.

We need to make sure we're in a good position to face challenges, we need to prepare well, working hard on and off the field, we need to focus on the details and make sure everything flows functionally. When all of that is put in place, the big things look after themselves. "
