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PRE-PREPARATORY NEWS HEAD OF DEPARTMENT'S REPORT

General:

The year began with a mini staff conference where we were welcomed back and addressed by Guy Pearson together with Marcus Bizony who took us through the excellent Matric results. Staff then met within their own schools and our Grades held meetings and spent time in their classrooms preparing for the start of the year.

All the Parent/Teacher meetings were held within the first two weeks of term, and our new parents in Grade R and across Grade 1 and 2 joined us

for a reception in Greg Brown's garden where they were once again welcomed to the school and addressed by him. The boys all settled down well and during the second week of term we carried out our Baseline assessments on all the Grade R boys to ascertain their strengths and areas which needed stimulation or support. This has proved to be a valuable exercise for the teachers with regards to their planning and teaching. It also provides an opportunity for Nicky van Zyl, our secretary, and me to get to know the parents a little better. June Charlton once again visited Grade 1 classes to assess their school readiness.

Mike Hampton, our youth pastor, began visiting the boys on a regular basis and joined us for two assemblies during the term – one while hosting the Independent Schools Scripture Union team. Each week Father Terry met with one of the Grades in the Brooke Chapel. The Grade R Family Service held in the Brooke Chapel towards the end of term was well attended by parents – creating much excitement for the boys with this being their first chapel service at Bishops. The Grade 1 and 2 boys enjoyed a special Ash Wednesday service in the Brooke Chapel, together with all the teachers. Those boys who chose to, received the ashes on their foreheads at the end of the service. On Founder's Day, a special service was held in our school hall during which some of the interesting history of the Pre-Prep and whole school was shared. The Pre-Prep celebrated 52 years, while the school celebrated 165 years in total. Afterwards the boys enjoyed cupcakes and juice before going home early.

Parent/Teacher meetings were held towards the end of term replacing a written report, and giving everyone the opportunity to find out how their sons had settled into school.

Our Fun Sports Day took place in the last week of term when every boy has the opportunity to participate in fun activities. This is always followed by the Moms' Race and then the exciting tug 'o war with the Dads really competing against each other in their class teams! Fortunately we don't keep any scores!

Staff development and news:

We welcomed Sharlene Groom into Grade 2 at the start of the year – she has settled in well and appears to be very happy in her classroom. Mandy Kowarski went off on maternity leave at the

end of January to have her twin daughters – they are all doing well. We hope to have Mandy rejoin us soon; however, we are very happy to have Claudia Ranoszek on our team, supporting the boys who are experiencing difficulties. Claudia's sons both came through the Pre-Prep so she is familiar with the school. We also welcomed Megan Blankenberg and Courtenay van Zyl to our Learnership Programme – Megan has completed her studies in psychology and is spending this year in Grade 1 gaining experience within a classroom. Courtenay is spending her first year of studying in Grade R with Carron Cale as her mentor. Before the start of second term, Ashleigh Swartz, who is in her final year of studying, got married to Grant Osborne – we wish them both every blessing for a happy future together. We held an English Language workshop, led by Nazli Meredith, during which we had a closer look at learning through play; the focus was on phonics and various games, both digital and concrete, which can be used to consolidate sounds and spelling. Rose Harris, Sharlene Groom and Noell Andrews, together with Anne McDonald, attended an excellent and thought provoking workshop on ADHD presented at UCT on a Saturday morning.

Sport:

As the first term is a busy one, we held swimming trials for our Grade 2s on the second day of term in an effort to give the swimmers an opportunity to receive some coaching before the galas began. Results of the B League Relay Gala held at Wynberg Boys Junior School and in which six schools participated are as follows: Backstroke 2nd place; Breaststroke 3rd place; Medley 3rd place and Freestyle 6th place. Results of the A League Relay Gala held at SACS in which five schools participated are as follows: Breaststroke 3rd place; Backstroke 3rd place; Medley 4th place and Freestyle 3rd place. Results of the final Pentangular Gala held at Rondebosch Boys' Preparatory School are as follows: Medley relay 2nd place; Freestyle relay 2nd place; U8 Freestyle swum by Reuben Truter 4th place; U8 Breaststroke, swum by Michael Kotze, 4th place; U8 Backstroke, swum by Reuben Truter, 3rd place. Overall Bishops were placed 3rd. A good start to the season!

During the second week of the new year, we ran heats across the three grades in order to select the final eight boys in each grade to participate during Sports Day. Track eliminations were held one morning at Lutgensvale and the boys who qualified began preparation for Sports Day which was held on the first Friday afternoon in February. The results are as follows: U6 75m **Reve Tuscher** 1st and the trophy, **Tristan Thirion** 2nd, **James Gordon** 3rd and **Luke Hofmeyer** 4th place; U7 75m Rowan Piorkowski 1st and the trophy, Simon Greager 2nd, Cayden Mushonga 3rd and Jaden Bosch 4th place; U8 75m Arran Muir 1st and the trophy, Adam Constant 2nd, James Kotze 3rd and Carwyn Davies 4th place. The team selected from these results then began practicing in earnest for the Southern Suburbs Quadrangular which was hosted by Bishops at Lutgensvale. The schools participating were Bishops, Rhenish, Western Province Prep School and Wynberg Boys Junior School. The results are as follows: U7 50m **Rowan Piorkowski** 1st, **Simon** Greager 3rd; U8 50m Arran Muir 1st, Adam Constant 3rd; U7 4 x 50m Shuttle Relay 2nd place; U8 4 x 50m Shuttle Relay 3rd place; U8 100 m **Arran Muir** 1st place. Early in March we participated in the Pentangular Athletics Meeting, hosted by Western Province Preparatory School, in which the following schools competed – Bishops, WPPS, SACS, RBPS and Wynberg Boys' Junior School. The results are as follows: U7 50m **Rowan Piorkowski** 3rd; U8 50m **Arran Muir** 3rd;

 $U7.4 \times 50 m$ 2nd and $U8.4 \times 50 m$ 3rd. Our Fun Sports Day was held in the last week of term which is always great fun for the boys, giving them all an opportunity to participate in fun activities within their class and grade. Once again we had excited parents and families who gave the boys plenty of support.

Outreach:

We continued our 'extra sandwich' day on Tuesdays. We have a team of dedicated parents who deliver these each week to Athwood Primary where they are gratefully received.

We supported the Animal Anti Cruelty Organisation by collecting food and other items for cats and dogs. This tied in nicely with the grade 1 theme of Pets.

News from Grade R

Part of our vision statement reads, "Inspire individuals to open their minds and hearts, and to reach their dreams." Term 1 began with the reading of Eric Carle's "The Very Hungry Caterpillar." In Grade R the boys are exposed to an array of experiences to help them discover what it is that will help them emerge from hungry little caterpillars into multifaceted butterflies flying towards their dreams. The boys started their journey by sharing their families and home backgrounds with their new class, and the teachers sharing the Bishops' family and school grounds with the boys. An early introduction to Chapel and Father Terry allowed the boys to see that spirituality can be celebrated in many different ways, and that laughter is an essential ingredient! He also explained that taking care of their physical bodies is important; linking in cleverly with the weekly "Body" theme, and making good use of George, the Biology labs' skeleton, for good visual effect.
