ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

Congratulations to the following learners - Warren Black, Alexander Rohrer, Thomas Vidal and Murray McKechnie who were placed second in the JSE Investment Challenge national competition at the end of last year.

Bishops was the top performing school in the South African Mathematics Olympiad for the 2nd year in a row, with 21 boys qualifying to participate in the 3rd and Final round. **Warren Black, Michael Thomson** and **Soo-Min Lee** were awarded Silver Medals for placing in the top 10 in the Junior Section in South Africa.

Last year, **Tom Orton,** who was in Grade 9 then, took it upon himself to further his Science knowledge. He wrote the Cambridge AS exams of Physical Science, which is normally only open to students who have passed Matric. The results were published last week, and Tom attained 78%. Well done!


Rhiyaan Smith and Daniel Potgieter – finalists at the Pieter Kooi Music Competition

At the end of 2011 two of our pupils, **Daniel Potgieter** (Percussion) and **Rhiyaan Smith** (Piano) participated in the prestigious Pieter Kooi Music Competition for High School musicians and both were selected as finalists competing against over 35 of the top musicians in Cape Town on various instruments. Daniel is to be particularly congratulated on being placed second in the competition. At the end of last year we were as thrilled with the results of our Associate Boards of the Royal Schools of Music results. We had 76 boys play these examinations and the overall average was 81% and at the Royals Schools of Music Prize Winners Concert, of the 30 performers in the concert, 12 of them were from Bishops. Added to this, Matthew Go-

lesworthy wrote the Grade 8 Theory paper and achieved 90%. At the end of 2011 we received the generous donation of an organ trophy to be awarded to a Bishops boy demonstrating exceptional

talent as an organist from Mr Sholto Cole. The trophy is to commemorate the life and work of Dr Claude Brown, a previous Director of Music (1934 – 1965). The design of the trophy is based on the main case of the Memorial Chapel Organ.

2012 started off with the news of a fantastic set of results achieved by the Matric music pupils of 2011. The class achieved an average of 85% and with 85% of the boys achieving an overall A symbol. On top of this, 3 of our Matric subject pupils were placed in the Top Ten positions in the Western Cape; **Matthew Golesworthy** was placed 2nd in the province, **Timothy Dennis** 5th and **Ramsay Collins** 10th. 




A big thank you to you and your team for all the brilliant planning, thoughtful ideas and endless time you have put into the Epic. Our son had such a meaningful time with a great bunch of guys. He came back so appreciative of his family, of life, of the stars and even veggies! We had a dinner last night to celebrate his return and to hear all the stories and were so impressed with the whole adventure. He even stood up and gave a speech of appreciation for all he has and all he wants to be. Thank you again - it must feel good to influence the boys' lives in such a memorable way.

It was unanimous from the boys at tribal council that:

- Epic is seriously a good thing for the boys.
- Epic is tough, but satisfying once you have pulled through.
- **Epic** breaks down barriers and stereotypes and makes the meaning of teamwork come alive.
- And much more....

It was a particularly moving experience for us to be reunited on Tuesday evening and there is no doubt that my letter to him and his response thereto has taken our relationship to another level.

These were just three extracts from the many received, which to me epitomises so much of what we endeavour to do through Epic.

Epic is now an entrenched part of what we do at Bishops – so much so that boys know what they can expect – a mixture of truth, romanticism, playground bravado and parking lot talk. The fact is that it is only when you go through the Epic that you understand how to endure bumpy roads, uncomfortable walking conditions, dirty clothes, heavy back packs and two minute noodles! I marvel at the positive attitude shown by far the majority of the boys; the enthusiasm for involving themselves in community work and the desire to push themselves beyond anywhere they've been before. It is so good seeing boys going out on their solo and hearing of their responses on their return. In one group this ranged from 'a waste of time' to 'it was the best thing I've ever done – particularly the letter from my dad'.

It is wonderful seeing how groups work together – the unity, the energy it creates that can take people along. There were one or two situations where this went a bit far and we had to step in and work with both individuals and the group/s in order to bring them in line with what we expected. That said, it is not what a person has done that judges them but rather how they respond to a situation.

In mentioning team work, we have to recognise the effort that all parts of Bishops puts in to make Epic what it is – from transport, cleaning, finance, food, maintenance to health, ODs, retired staff, friends of the school and current staff. Special mention also of the parents who kindly loaned a boat, a vehicle, donated goods, gave of their time and made financial contributions. It is such a privilege to be able to work with a group of people dedicated to making this venture the success it is. We are also most grateful to the large number of businesses, individuals and groups in the Cederberg region who do so much for us and go the extra mile. We are also grateful for the highly



professional medical support we can call on – in Clanwilliam, Citrusdal and this past year even the services of the SA Red Cross Air Mercy Service (AMS).

Many hours of work, discussion and thought go into preparing boys for the Epic – from the number of emails received, it is clear that much of this happens at home (and rightly so!) but boys spend time in their LO classes discussing topics pertinent to Epic. In addition, we do group talks and this past year saw us add the most important topic of 'fire' to our training talks. Around a third of the staff participated in a first aid course that was designed with Epic in mind and in addition, hiking staff went on a training weekend in preparation for Epic. We have similar plans afoot for this year and one of the things we are looking forward to is our participation in a National Outdoor Education Conference for SA schools. We hope to share with many other schools who do similar things to us, learn from them and hopefully, they from us.

We end with another quote from a parent – if ever there was a reason needed to continue with Epic, it is given here: I think that this will become one of the defining points in his life and I, for one, am looking forward to seeing him go forward with renewed confidence and self-awareness.

ACTIVITIES WEEK 2011

Teachers-in-Charge: Mr P. Hyslop and Ms K. Spindler





2011 saw a very productive year for the Bishops Global Issues Network. The students engaged in various projects — either individually or in groups - and were exposed to many interesting concepts and global issues by guest speakers throughout the year. GIN's main project over 2011, 'SmartFacts', involved working collaboratively with BSmrt in conjunction with the social network, MXit. The group was responsible for researching and distributing 30 interesting facts relevant to the youth

of Africa daily through the MXit server. The project served as a test facility for the already fast-developing idea of using cell phone technology for learning, and was a great success, disseminating facts relating to human rights, history and the world around us to about 7 million students and young people daily. GIN also gives students a platform to pursue their own global issues projects. Jaryd Hermann and Brain Magai, for example, were involved in a project that set out to study the rate of growth of the trees on the Bishops campus while Ethan Gray, Reid Falconer and Martin Dyer took part in a research project and competition hosted by the South African Institute of International Affairs (SAIIA). The group were required to complete a comprehensive research essay that dealt with the impact of climate change on water resources both nationally and globally. The essay was selected as a competition finalist and Bishops took part in a final presentation against five finalist schools. Martin Dyer was selected as one of the best speakers of the evening and was given the opportunity to attend COP17 at the end of November last year. He spent 5 days with the

SAIIA Youth Delegation at the event. They had the honour of writing up the 2011 Durban Youth Protocol which served as the 'voice' of South Africa's youth and laid out what they wanted to accomplish with respect to climate change. The Protocol was then presented to the Minister of Women, Children and People with Disabilities at an official COP17 event. Martin shared his full experience with us at our GIN meeting this term. The Bishops' Global Issues Network accomplished a lot over the year and engaged with ideas, issues and projects both locally and globally. With plans already underway for the year ahead, we hope that this trend of productive, hands-on engagement with important global issues and challenges affecting not only our school and local community, but also South Africa and the world beyond, will continue to grow. 
HISTORICAL BENCH

The society was established by Mr Murray in 1999 the year Bishops turned 150. This society has significantly grown in numbers, thanks to the excellent efforts by its co-chairpersons Samuel Wolski and Joseph Kahn, both from Grade 11. The first meeting of the season, excellently chaired by Joseph Kahn (Sam was away on exchange), was a discussion of the implications of the Palestinian Authority's application by Mahmoud Abbas, its president, to the United Nations Secretary

General, for full international recognition. If this were to be carried the Palestine Liberation Organization would become the UN's 194th member. Admittedly this was not an easy topic to discuss; but the members have the opportunity to read through some articles made available to them, beforehand, so they will be informed to an extent, when discussing A further reason for choosing this topic was to make members aware of international political affairs. We will follow-up with this specific topic at a forthcoming meeting, to see the outcome, and discuss its implications. The second meeting was excellently co-chaired by Sam and Joe, on the topic of Yemen. This is important for an understanding of the events in Tunisia, Egypt and more recently Libya. The 2011 – 2012 uprisings was initially against unemployment and economic conditions, as well as corruption, but escalated to calls for the resignation of President Ali Abdullah Saleh, which materialized at the end of last year, after 33 years in power. The current situation in Yemen was discussed, where it will remain to be seen how the situation will turn out in months to come. In both meetings the chairpersons greatly succeeded in evoking excellent participation from the members, which is one of the core objectives

2 November 2011: Historian R.W. Johnson spoke to History Society members about Julius Malema, the highly controversial ANC youth league politician. He covered the topic of: Who or what Malema represents. The main thrust of our

visitor's argument, entirely accurate as events were to prove a few months later, was that he personally considered Malema an overrated force and personality within the African National Congress's power structures and who in time, was very likely to experience harsh disciplining from the party's leaders. This was consequential, for the numerous occasions on which Malema had embarrassed ANC senior leaders, or spoken or behaved publically in the most base of manners. Johnson described how in many ways Malema represented the persona of dysfunctional black males from amongst his own generation, with common education and social class limitations. Malema came of age well after the change of government in South Africa during 1994 and has made several extraordinary assumptions about his political and material future. These assumptions included that a markedly wealthy lifestyle awaited black males who fought or ingratiated their way up the ANC party's hierarchy; on the assumption that such was what they were fully entitled to. Malema's attitudes are also typical of other such ambitious young black males from poverty-stricken backgrounds, many of whom have often grown up without a father. Such ideas were also fed by the ANC's excitable political rhetoric alongside the rapid emergence of black "entrepreneurs" and "businessmen" with their most obvious close government links. Mr Johnson explained that the ANC was in many ways a conservative organisation, where seniority and the perceived dignity of its leaders were important factors which young members were expected to take careful cognisance of. The talk was attended by over forty History Society members who asked numerous questions of the speaker once he had concluded. It is of course very important that our boys receive an understanding of South African political and constitutional issues and the History Society attempts to fill this need.

1 February 2012: A local American military history enthusiast Mr Stan Lambrick, who some years ago addressed the History Society on an aspect of the Vietnam War, gave an illustrated presentation dealing with the March 1836 Battle of the Alamo, which was the starting point for Texas freeing itself from Mexican rule and ultimately joining the United States in 1845 as the 28th state, being today geographically and demographically the second biggest state in the Union. The Battle of the Alamo has been the subject of many book and film representations; it always serves as one of many historical moments upon which patriotic national histories of the United States have been built. This talk was particularly relevant to both our grade ten and grade eleven history students where the syllabi cover aspects of global nineteenth century historical trends; including imperialism and 'manifest destiny' as a concept towards assisting their understanding the rise of the United States as a global power. But our students do not generally study in depth details

of America's fascinating and often heroic history. The talk was attended by forty members. History Society membership is based strictly upon actual attendances at meetings. A roll is carefully compiled and recorded regarding which members have attended for the purpose of recording this upon individual student profiles.






Marian Penso and Luke Bush

The race starts in Banff Canada and follows the Continental Divide of North America all the way south to a remote border post on the American-Mexican border. The race is 4418km long and 90% of the route is 'off road'. Luke and Marian took 29 consecutive days to finish the race: they averaged 145km a day; they spent between 10 and 15 hours cycling each day; they crossed the Continental Divide 27 times, an average of

2000m of climbing a day. The race is a self-supported race which means that they had to carry their own food, water, clothing, tent, spares etc – there was no back-up vehicle, medical support or assistance of any kind! It was great to hear their account of the race and all their experiences. They learnt so much about themselves, their fellow competitors and the people they met along the way. This talk kindled the adventurous spirit of the boys.

In our first meeting this year Professor John Rogers gave a talk entitled 'Time travel in the Middle East'. He shared about his travels through Israel, Egypt and Jordan. He focused particularly on his visit to Saint Catherine's Monastery in the Sinai Peninsula and to Petra in Jordan. 




PHILOSOPHY


PUBLIC SPEAKING SOCIETY

the top 20 and 50. During the October holidays last year, Nationals were held here at Bishops where



TEN CLUB



CRICKET

Cricket remains one of the busiest of all of the host of extramural activities at Bishops – and rightly so! This is a school with proud traditions, and Bishops has a proud sporting tradition, and the proud cricketing tradition continues as a new generation of cricketers take to the fields in pursuit of fun, exercise and excellence. This year, we are fielding fourteen teams across the three age groups – only the second time in my thirteen years at Bishops that we have fielded five U14 teams – well done, Grade 8s!

The quality of the coaching personnel remains the envy of many other schools; and I would like to pay tribute to both the coaches who are on the teaching staff and the "outsiders" (mainly young ODs) whom I employ to assist the teachers or (as in four cases) actually run teams – they all do superb jobs and add a great deal of value to the experiences of Bishops boys.

Grant Norton and **Richard Smith** set a fine example to others in the way that they plan and execute their 1st XI practice sessions and warm-ups, and through the passion and expertise that they bring to their coaching; whilst **Mervin Walsh**, **Warwick Richter**, **David Russell** and **Dean Sudding** do a fine job in ensuring that their U14 charges get as much as possible out of their cricket, and also ensuring that the parents are well-informed about what is going on. Over the years, the boys have come to love playing for **John Knight** and **Sean Henchie** in the 2nd XI and U17A respectively, and they, together with **Jean Nolte** (4th XI) and **Vaughan Harries** (5th XI) are often under great pressure to produce winning teams in the face of the loss of matrics to other sports (as the desire to play 1st XV rugby grows) and academics (as finals loom larger and larger). Grade 9 boys (i.e. fourteen-year-olds-going-on-eighteen ...) are notoriously difficult to knuckle-down to work hard at their individual games or as genuine team members, but **Willem Steyn** (U15A) and **John Holtman** (U15B) have both the experience and the knowledge to know just how to handle their players, and the U15s get much out of their brands of coaching and managing.

In addition to all of the above coaches — all except Vaughan Harries (Matric 2006) on the full-time teaching staff — we are lucky to have coaches of the calibre of the following involved in Bishops cricket: **Ashley Wallace** (Level 2 coach) helps with the 2nd XI, **Sean Simkins** (UCT student) with the U17As, **Brendon Hamman** (ex-stooge in Founders) with the U15As, **Luke Jacobs** and **Nikolai Smith** (Matric 2011) with the 6th XI, **Dylan Holtman** (Matric 2006) with the U15Bs, **Jonno Gilbert** (UCT student and ex-Hilton) and **Imraan Hendricks** (Matric 2009) with the U15Cs, **Nico Loizides** (Matric 2008) with the U14As, and **John Faure** (Matric 2009) and brother **Brian** (Matric 2010) with the U14Es. Throw into this mix a music teacher who umpires every Saturday (when he's not on another ski-slope in the Alps or Colorado or wherever...) and also whenever there's a day/night game that does not clash with an orchestra practice — **Joc Wrensch** — and one has got a coaching set-up that can only be good for Bishops cricket. I thank each one for their unselfish dedication and their commitment to "the summer game" at Bishops.

Our facilities are receiving ongoing attention from the likes of Pikkie van Rooyen and Richard Khontyo and their assistants, whilst Bill Bulgen oversees all with a careful and caring eye; and the

fields (particularly the showpiece Frank Reid) have seldom looked in such fine condition – thank you to all of the support staff and Annamarie (Turftek) for their continued contributions.

Sometime later this year, our facilities will be given a tremendous boost with the construction of our indoor cricket centre, made possible by the incredible generosity of the Coutts-Trotter family, who want a memorial for their son **Steffan** (*Matric 1996*), who tragically passed away during the Two Oceans Marathon of 2011. The Stefan Coutts-Trotter Memorial Cricket Centre will boast four lanes of nets – one dedicated to a bowling machine, one dedicated to a technology called PitchVision (similar to the principles of television's Hawk-Eye) and two nets for batting and bowling and/or throw-downs. It will also have video cameras and a viewing room for analysis of what video-taping and PitchVision reveal about batting and bowling techniques. This will be a real boost to Bishops cricket – I can't wait!

Another boost will be the mid-year tour to England. Following the successful cricket tour to the UK in 2008, it is now the turn of a new generation of Bishops cricketers to act as ambassadors for our school and our country once again by touring England. The team departs for England on Friday 22 June and will play in two prestigious festivals: the Silk Cup at Shrewsbury School (with matches against Shrewsbury, Eton and Oundle) and the Tonbridge Festival (with matches against Tonbridge and Millfield, and against a yet-to-be-confirmed touring Australian school). In addition, we shall play matches versus Charterhouse School, Wellington College, Brighton College, Dulwich College, Warwick School, Sussex CCC U19 (at Arundel Castle) and an Althorpe XI put together by Earl Charles Spencer, and played on the Althorpe Estate. In total, we shall be playing thirteen matches on this tour.

An overseas tour provides a wonderful opportunity to prepare young cricketers for their immediate cricketing futures, and is a key part of our cricket development programme, which is being managed by a small committee, the main aim of which is to ensure that the quality and standard of the cricket offering at Bishops is improved upon and maintained, and that generation after generation of Bishops cricketers continue to enjoy this wonderful test of character known as cricket.

In December last year, several cricketers were rewarded for their hard work, dedication and performances by being selected to represent WP at a variety of inter-provincial tournaments. They were: **Seb Golding** (U19A); **Nikolai Smith** and **Richard Tissiman** (U19B); **Digby Harding, Kyle Jacobs** and **Daniel Russell** (U17B); and **Saud Abrahams** and **Daniel Lombard** (U15A).

To date, our teams have fared well across the board, with the 1st XI unbeaten after eight matches against other schools. Difficult games vs Rondebosch and Grey HS lie ahead at the time of writing. Full reports on the performances of the various teams will form the bulk of the report in the next issue of this magazine.

In conclusion, many thanks to the catering staff for all of their hard work, and to all of those many parents who spend so much time supporting us and their sons – this is all greatly appreciated.

We had Wynberg 84/7 before dropping a vital catch which cost us the match in a rain-delayed fixture and then we were 103/0 chasing 206 to win with 35 overs still to bat when we somehow managed to score just 21/4 off the next 20 overs against Rondebosch and ended up playing out a tame draw.

This meant that the team finished the term with 5 wins, 2 draws, 1 loss and 1 match abandoned from their 9 matches (other than T20's) played since September for an overall year record

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of 23 wins, 2 draws and three losses in the 29 completed matches they played during 2011. One match was abandoned due to rain.

We also entered the local Edusport T20 competition hosted by Bergyliet for the first time and have just completed the first rounds of the national T20 event. The T20 tournaments always come at a particularly difficult time of the year for Bishops – right in the middle of exams and then into the Epic so that it places us under enormous pressure to fit fixtures in. Nevertheless it is the new format on cricket and we need to embrace it and somehow fit it into our already hectic schedule.

Our batters continued to dominate opposition bowling attacks with **Seb Golding** once again going past 1500 runs for the calendar year scoring two centuries in the process – against Union HS and Somerset College and on both occasions he also took 5 wickets in the match. **Seb** continued to be the axis around which our batting functioned and he had good support from **Richard Tissiman** (particularly at Cape Schools Week where he scored back to back fifties), from **Ramsay Collins** who also scored two important fifties and from **Luke Jacobs** who saw us home against Dale with a well played 45* in putting together his best innings of the year. **Nikolai Smith** played two swashbuckling knocks in the T20 version and **Daniel Russell** announced his arrival by scoring a good 67 in the final Rondebosch match. The other batters had very few opportunities and **Sean-Michael Campleman** will be looking forward to moving up the order next year after a term. He did get the chance to play a match-winning innings against UWC in a pre-season friendly and took it with both hands to steer us to an unlikely victory.

Our spin trio of Seb Golding, Digby Harding and Ramsay Collins continued to bowl most opponents into a coma and claimed the majority of the wickets with **Ramsay** getting his first and only 5-wicket haul against Dale College. The unusual balance of our attack put enormous pressure on our two seamers at certain times but Nikolai Smith chipped in with just under 50 wickets for the year as our main strike seamer while James Baikoff regularly bowled tight overs at one end to build the pressure. Our method was to strangle opponents by stringing together tight overs and building the pressure. Invariably the release shot brought a wicket. The bowlers were well backed up in the field where **Richard Tissiman**, **Luke Jacobs** and Ramsay Collins in particular were superb in the ring. Kyle Jacobs kept wicket with distinction and ended the year on 99 dismissals with a full year still to play. He has really quick hands and his ability to stand up to the seamers placed enormous extra pressure on batters. Seb **Golding** caught anything and everything in the slips, gully or on the drive and **Digby Hard**ing, Nikolai Smith, Sean-Michael Campleman and Nikolai Smith were excellent in the deep where they caught most catches and used their bullet arms to good effect. **Daniel Russell** also took one or two sharp catches to complete a good fielding unit which was a major part of the team's success.

This report would not be complete without a special paragraph on **Seb Golding. Seb** came into the 1st X1 early in his grade 10 year in early 2009 as a leg spinner and batted at no 10 for the first term. He got an opportunity to open the batting late in that first term and immediately scored a century against Marlborough College. And so the floodgates opened. **Seb** scored over 3500 runs including 7 centuries and 26 fifties in 81 innings for the first eleven in a career span-

ning exactly 100 matches. In so doing, he has faced around 6000 balls and batted the team into winning positions almost every time he got to the wicket. His amazing powers of concentration and hunger for runs combined with a water-tight technique placed him a league above any other schoolboy batter in the country this year. He is also a top, top leggie who already bowls every ball which a top quality test leg spinner would have in his armoury – the leggie, the top spinner, the googly and the slider and all with uncanny accuracy. He took 145 career wickets at an economy rate of under 3 runs per over and bowled around 650 overs for the first eleven. His ability to stay calm under pressure and to think rationally made him a stand-out leader. In 93 games excluding T20's, he has been part of a team which has won 57 matches and lost just 7. An amazing record from a special player.

I would like to conclude by thanking every single player for putting themselves on the line whenever they played, and for so obviously having great pride in their performance and such passion for the baggy blue. Your behaviour on and off the field was also outstanding and you certainly made Bishops proud this year.

We have all heard of helping and serving others, but **Dee Ferrandi** took scoring for the Bishops 1st X1 to the next level. **Dee** did so much more than just score. He wrote a report on the match, submitted the match scorecard and completed the wagon wheels before he had even closed the score box at the end of play. He fed the bowling machine at practice to free up the coaches for fielding and chatting individually to players and controlled the fielding log. I know the team would join me in saluting what **Dee** has meant to the team over exactly 100 matches as the team scorer.

Richard Smith who assists me with the coaching was again simply outstanding. He has an energy, a charisma, and a zest for life which visibly oozes out of him. Because he is still so young and fit, he was my legs and he loves throwing to batters, working on their fielding and building up their physical strength. This team would not have competed like it did without Richard's drive, passion, will to win and medical support.

James Baikoff, Sean-Michael Campleman and Daniel Russell were awarded half colours.

Seb Golding was selected to represent the WP U18 team at the Khaya Majola Coke Week held in Cape Town. **Richard Tissiman** and **Nikolai Smith** were selected for the WP U18B team while **Daniel Russell, Kyle Jacobs** and **Digby Harding** were selected for the WP U17B team.

The Bishops Rowing Club has been enjoying success in the regattas that have taken place since the start of the season in September 2011. In the previous magazine, we reported on the Bishops Spring Regatta and the opening of the new rowing shed located at Zeekoevlei. In the season under review, Bishops Rowing has had some good results. These came from the efforts that the various age group crews put in at the training camp that preceded the second half of the season.

January Training Camp: The majority of the rowing club members attended the training camp held near Robertson on the Breede River.

The camp, held over 5 days, gives the oarsmen the opportunity to settle down into the rhythm of training - a prerequisite for optimal performance in the second half and busiest part of the

rowing season from January to April. From all accounts, the camp went extremely well. The weather was good with not too much wind to hamper training on the water. Crews were able to get to work together over extended periods of time ensuring that they were well prepared for the competitive regattas that were to take place early in the first term of 2012. At the training camp, the head coach and Director of Rowing, **Samuel Wells**, reiterated the importance of good nutrition that arises from healthy eating. He also stressed how important rest is – and in the term to date, rowing parents will have noticed that there are periods where the rowers are able to regain their strength through good periods of rest with little or no exercise. This is in contrast to years gone by where training took place almost every day.

Knysna Regatta – October 2011: One of the highlights of the first half of the rowing season is the much-anticipated Knysna Regatta and Kynsna Heads Race. This regatta took place in the third week of October. All crews were involved in the racing which took place against other school's crews from the Western Cape and Eastern Cape. Racing took place on a 1000m course that was set up on the Western side of the Knysna Lagoon directly in front of Belvidere Estate. The residents of the estate welcomed the rowers, which they do each year, allowing them the use of the beautiful lawned area between the lagoon and the water-facing homesteads. This year Bishops stayed at the magnificent Belvidere Manor boutique hotel which is situated directly opposite the regatta venue. The accommodation was first class and the food excellent - thanks must go to Val Francis who negotiated the deal with the management of Belvidere Manor, and in so doing kept the costs of the weekend to a reasonable level. The manager of the establishment, Mike Mills, commented that he was very impressed with the manner in which the Bishops rowers had conducted themselves while staying at his hotel and hoped to welcome them back in October 2012. A big thank you must go to all the coaching staff who ensured the crews were managed well during their stay. The regatta programme at Knysna is a long one of over 100 races completed in just one day. Racing started at 6.30am and finished almost 12 hours later keeping the small but dedicated team of officials, many of them Bishops parents, very busy indeed! The crews had great weather to row in this year with conditions almost perfect. The day's highlight was the Open VIII's race. Bishops was up against some strong crews from the

Eastern Cape and Cape Town. The race was hotly contested and at the end the winner was not immediately clear – it was a toss up between Bishops and Selbourne College. Thanks to new video camera technology at the finish it was found that the race ended with a dead heat between the two and the accolades were shared! This is a very rare occurrence in rowing given the long distances that races are rowed over. On the Sunday morning, the Knysna Heads race was run. This is only open to U16 and Open VIII crews who row up the river 6.2km and then race back to Belvidere starting at 60 second intervals. This year's race was the closest that one could have hoped for with Bishops pipping St Andrews and Selbourne to the line to take the honours!

Local Regattas in the Western Cape: Other races in the first half of the season in the fourth term of 2011 were the Misverstand Heads race and the half-season ending Boat Race that is held each year at Port Alfred. Both these races are over 6.2km and demand extraordinary stamina from the boys. Bishops VIIIs participated in these events with reasonable placings in both. After the January camp, it was back to the racing over 500m, 1000m and 2000m courses. A number of regattas are held at Elgin near Grabouw over a 4 week period starting in January. In the SACS regatta Bishops won several medals. The regatta program was much longer than usual and ran to 72 events, with rowers participating late into Saturday afternoon. Bishops crews did well with 5 gold medals being earned. The u15, u16 and Open single sculls all won. The u15 coxed quad won their race and the highlight of the day was a closely contested 1st VIII race that saw Bishops win by a narrow margin over SACS with the Bishops 2nd VIII coming a respectable 3rd. In the B division, the Open 2nd Pair and 2nd Four also won their races. The following weekend, it was the turn of Rondebosch to host their regatta which also took place at Elgin. Despite the wind gusting from time to time, the entire regatta was run according to the program with all 72 races being completed. Piers Johnston won the u15 single sculls race. In a repeat of the VIIIs race from the previous week, Bishops once again ran out winners over the 2000m course in choppy conditions. SACS was second followed by the Bishops 2nd VIII. The Rondebosch regatta was the last competitive event that the Bishops rowers participated in before the much-anticipated Buffalo Regatta and Selbourne Sprints Regatta that will be held in East London from the 16th – 18th February this year.
