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

### ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

We congratulate **Saleem Firfirey** on having his English creative essay published in *English Alive 2012*. This is an excellent achievement as *English Alive* is an annual anthology of writing from high schools and colleges in Southern Africa and has become one of the most popular and well-known 'products' available to all South African schools and colleges. **Saleem** was also one of 6 pupils invited to read their work at the launch of the publication, held at Bishops in August.

The Mathematics Department proudly announced that Bishops had won the UCT Mathematics Competition for the 5th year in a row. Three pairs and seven individuals received gold medals. In Grade 9: **Sam Jeffery** and **Christian Cotchobos** came 1st as a pair; **Soo-Min Lee, Michael Thompson** and **Jonti Oehley** were placed 1st, 4th and 6th, respectively, in the Individual Event. In Grade 10: **Warren Black** and **Murray McKechnie** came joint 3rd as individuals. In Grade 11: **Jaydon Farao** and **Ziyaad Adam** came 1st as a pair and **Daniel Chung** and **Adam Smith** 2nd; **Guy Paterson-Jones** and **Sevi Steingazner** were placed 1st and 9th as individuals. **Guy Paterson-Jones** collected the Mona Leeuwenberg Trophy on behalf of the team. Fourteen boys qualified for Round 3 of the South African Mathematics Olympiad – pupils who qualify for Round 3 are the top 100 Junior and top 100 Senior students in the country.



Shortly after the winter break, the Chaplains of the various schools across South Africa met at the Kruger National Park. The conference was organised by the Rev. Michael Stone and his wife, Lynn.

They had only been at Penryn College for six months before the Conference started and managed to create something very special. The overall focus of the conference was sustainability, an awareness of the environment, community outreach and recycling. There were interesting talks on topics such as cyber bullying, teen culture, the interrelatedness of ecosystems, the story of stuff (waste creation and disposal) and the perceived need for chaplains in the spiritual formation of schools. Meditations and prayer mornings

and evenings happened in diverse places during game drives. The busses made their own way to the various designated places and the cry, "What did you see?" filled the air as each group drove in. Comparisons of sightings of elephants, rhino, lion, leopard, hippo, buffalo, hyena, snake, ground hornbills, lilac crested rollers and "Macdonalds on the hoof" (Impala) turned all into instant experts amid the prayer leader's strident, "Let us pray!" Chaplains were also introduced to the Outreach Programme of Penryn College (Penreach) which has done amazing work in the communities of the Lowveld. Chaplains were invited to spend the morning at a local primary school and were each given a cardboard cut-out to convert into a solar heater with the help of the Gr. 5 children. It was an interesting morning trying to explain to the children how to make and use this very useful, inexpensive stove while trying to explain the science of it to children with little or no English. The hardest part was trying to work out which one of the five children should be given the stove to take home.

Back at Bishops, school and community events continued. These included the sad end to the second term with the sudden passing of Andrew Meddick, a student of the College. His funeral service on Thursday 21st June was followed by that of the Rev. Trevor Tyres, previously Chaplain at Bishops on Friday 22nd June. Other funerals included those of Peter H.F. Brooke (OD), Jean Stuart, John Lowe, Neil Ovenstone (OD) and Hamilton van Breda (Hammie) (OD). Other occasions included the wedding of Lisa Stern to Andrew de Villiers and the baptisms of Elizabeth Steyn and Raedin Witbooi. As we look forward to the Confirmation service of 2nd September we ask your prayers for each of the 28 candidates from Bishops as well as those from St George's, Herschel and St Cyprian's. This has again been a very busy six months for the boys and staff of the Music Department, with numerous concerts, exams and eisteddfods taking place.

Late in the first term, 17 boys wrote the Royal Schools grade 5 theory exam and we were very pleased with the result of nine distinctions (90% and above) and seven merits (80% and above). During the April holidays Shannon Thebus, Davide Scott, Stefan Dominicus, Nicholas Hyslop and Neil Robertson participated in the annual Franschoek Chamber Music Festival. This provided a great opportunity for them to participate with other top musicians from around the Cape, working together in chamber groups. Also in the holidays, Lood van Niekerk participated in the prestigious Stellenbosch Piano Symposium, where he attended lectures, had master classes with leading pianists and played in a lunch-hour concert.

A number of our pianists performed in the Cape Town Eisteddfod during term two. We congratulate all those boys who took part, but especially Joshua Wells, Rhiyaan Smith and Lood van Niekerk who each won gold medals for winning their sections. In addition, the Senior Marimba Band won a gold medal, winning their section, and were invited to play at the prize-winners' concert. In May the Matrics presented what is becoming the annual Matric Lunch Hour Concert, in which they performed their chamber piece, now a requirement for the WCED exams, as well as each playing a solo piece. This was good preparation for their May practical exam which followed the next week.

A number of boys played Royal Schools practical exams in May (the early session) and we were delighted with their results, which included one Pass and five Distinctions. This included a Distinction for Neil Robertson for Grade 8 Organ. Because Neil has now achieved two different Grade 8 exams with scores above 80% (Organ and Piano) he was awarded his Distinction Tie in Music – a well-earned achievement after many years of dedication to his music.

The College Evensong in term two was a special occasion, as the Chapel Choir was joined by the Herschel Chorale for a festive evening of song. The anthem for the evening was particularly enjoyable, as it was a jazzed-up version of Handel's well-known "Hallelujah Chorus". The Jazz Band, under Paul Mayers, put on a spirited performance at the Baxter Jazz Festival in May. This festival is an annual showcase of jazz bands from around the peninsula. Term two finished in the usual way with the Bishops Eisteddfod (please see the separate report in the magazine on this).

The winter holiday was a busy period for many musicians. Our *a cappella* singing group, Simply Blue, went on a very successful tour of Greece, accompanied by Marion Bradley and Stephen Carletti. Shannon Thebus and Neil Robertson participated in the Stellenbosch International Chamber Music Festival and were both selected to play in the Festival Concert Orchestra conducted by well-known German conductor, Bernhard Gueller. Shannon Thebus then headed off to attend the National Youth Orchestra course, held in Bloemfontein and Johannesburg, where he was selected as principal Horn player for the Concert Orchestra. Also during the holidays Jake Bennett and Adam Rothschild travelled to the USA to attend a five-week summer school course at Berklee College of Music in Boston, joining many other musicians from around the world. During this time they participated in lectures with top musicians from all fields and genres of music, and played a number of gigs and concerts – by all accounts this was a highlight of their music careers to date.

One of the highlights of term three was the combined orchestra concert, where the orchestras of Bishops and Herschel joined forces to play a concert in the Memorial Chapel at Bishops. The boys and girls had been working for six months to put together a full and exciting programme, which included works by Mahler, Bach and Saint-Saëns, as well as Cape Town composers, Allan Stephenson and Stephen Carletti (OD and current music teacher at Bishops). Peter Anguria, singing a Bach Aria, and Daniel Potgieter, playing the Stephenson Percussion Concerto (both of School House), were amongst the main soloists for the evening. Another highlight of the evening was "Shadows of Skye", an arrangement by Stephen Carletti of the popular folk tune the Skye Boat Song, which included solos for Violin, Bagpipes and Snare Drum. The major work for the evening was the "Carnival of the Animals" by Camille Saint-Saëns, a collection of 14 movements for orchestra and two pianos. A total of 16 different pianists had the opportunity of playing a movement or two with the orchestra. In addition, the poetry written by Ogden Nash to accompany the movements was read before each piece by the Principals of Bishops and Herschel, Grant Nupen and Bruce Probyn.

The proceeds of the concert will go towards the purchase of a brand new Kawai piano for St Paul's Primary School in the Bo-Kaap. A further sponsor for the piano was found in Ian Burgess-Simpson Pianos, the piano tuner and supplier for both Bishops and Herschel. They made a generous donation and covered the costs of the tunings and moves of the pianos for our concert too. We are most grateful for their support of this project. At the end of the concert, Grant Nupen and Bruce Probyn were able to announce the hand-over of the piano to the Deputy Principal of St Paul's, Mrs Carolyn Cannon (also a Bishops parent). Mrs Cannon expressed the grateful thanks of St Paul's Primary to the boys and girls of Bishops and Herschel for all their hard work in putting on this concert for such a good cause.

As I write, a number of our pianists are competing in the Johann Vos Piano Competition, and we are delighted that Sevi Steingaszner and Rhiyaan Smith have made it through to the final round. In addition, eleven Bishops boys also competed this weekend in the Pieter Kooij competition, and again we congratulate Soo-Min Lee, Sevi Steingaszner and Rhiyaan Smith who have made the final round of this competition.

On the horizon still this term is a concert at Grove Primary (featuring the Windband, Jazz Band and Simply Blue), the Mock Matric practical exams, the Royal Schools practical exams, as well as the evening concert for Royal Schools candidates. At the end of this term we say a sad farewell to Ms Rolene Stofberg, who will have spent nine months in the department this year replacing the various staff members who have been on long leave over the course of the year (Joc Wrensch, Andrea Rutter and Mark Mitchell). Rolene has fitted in so easily and done a fantastic job – we thank her sincerely for her sterling contribution to Music at Bishops this year.

# **MUSEUM & ARCHIVES**

### Archivist: Mr Paul Murray; Asst Archivist: Mr Basil Bey

During the course of the third term this year, Mrs Susan Duffy of Lighthorne Heath, Learnington Spa in Warwickshire in England, sent us an undated letter written on a Founders House letterhead, by a person named Hugh, to his father, and referred in the letter to his brother Paul. The clue as to the writer lay in the time he would have been in Founders House and so when there was reference to Fr Luscombe in the letter; it became clear it had been written in the 1920s when The Reverend Herbert Luscombe was the

Housemaster. With this information it did not take Mr Basil Bey, the Assistant Archivist, very long to uncover the details, and he reported from the Archives that the letter was written by Edmund Hugh Ashton (known as Hugh), to his father. The reference to 'Paul' is Paul Wingrave Ashton, his brother. As the time of the Ashton brothers' stay in Founders House, coincided for the years 1925 - 1930; one can assume the letter was written sometime during this time. After leaving school, Paul was tragically killed, aged 22, when he was a flying officer at the RAF College, Cranwell, participating in an air show in Kent on 23 May 1936. He was the younger son of Mrs R H Struben. Paul was very talented, being the Head Prefect in Founders earning Colours for rugby and athletics and being awarded the Jamison Cup in 1931 and 1932. He represented the RAF at rugby, athletics and boxing and received the Sword of Honour from the RAF College, Cranwell and best officer of the year (the sword is currently displayed here at Bishops in Founders House Hall). His elder brother Hugh was also extremely talented, a Rhodes Scholar, who wrote several books on African history, and graduated with a PhD and served in the Colonial Service. Paul Murray

## FRENCH TOUR

The College has undertaken seven French Tours over the course of the past fifteen years or so, and, at least in the opinion of the guide in question, the most recent edition would have to be described as the most successful and the most enjoyable. This judgement is based on all that was undertaken, and on the vast myriad



of things which the young itinerants managed to see and to do. All in all, the tour amounted

to a jam-packed three-and-a-half weeks in Nice and in the Provençal hinterland, an unforgettable time of discovery and adventure during which sixteen Bishops boys quite simply fell in love with France and with all things French.

Let's not forget that the tour's primary *raison d'être* was to provide the young men with an opportunity to put into practice the language skills which they have picked up in the classrooms of the College, over the course of the past three or four years (the four youngest tourists are currently in Grade Ten, while the remaining dozen seniors are all in Grade Eleven or Twelve). Undoubtedly, their chance to spend quality time with host families in Nice worked its magic; there is nothing like complete "immersion" to assist in one's mastery of expression and accent, and to grow one's vocabulary and confidence. Morning lessons at the *France-Langue* language school also played their part; during the first two weeks of the trip, the boys spent three hours a day with enthusiastic teachers focussed on polishing up their oral communication and comprehension, before setting off on each afternoon's excursion, determined to put to use all that they had acquired during lesson-time.

And what of those excursions? Nice provides a wonderful base for discovering all that there is to see up and down the length of the Riviera; it is a beautiful town which continually seeks to improve itself, to upgrade and to modernise. The recently-introduced tramway makes downtown travel a pleasure, while from the train station at one end of Nice or from the bus station at the other, all neighbouring towns and regions are comfortably within reach. And so it was that our young tourists set about in their endeavour to experience all that can be done in this neck of the woods ... from 'A' to 'V'', from Antibes to Vence, they caught trains, hired bicycles, boarded launches and ferries, and bussed themselves about, along with the many other tourists who are annually drawn to this hot and sunny playground. During this time, the boys also reported that they were walking a great deal more each day than were used to, back at home!

Amongst the excursions undertaken, all manner of museums and galleries were visited; factories that produce beautiful glassware and exotic jams were visited; time was spent wandering around local markets, often in an attempt to seek out ever more exotic and as-yet-untested and un-tasted delicacies to put on a slice of *baguette*!

There were many highlights within that first fortnight ... a day spent in gleaming Monaco; a hike

around the peninsula of Saint-Jean-Cap-Ferrat (which culminates in an unforgettable leap into the cool and salty waters of the Mediterranean); playing boules under the plane trees of Saint-Paul-de-Vence, just beyond the walls that enclose that lovely hilltop village; a picnic amongst the pine trees on the island of Sainte-Marguerite, which bobs about just off the coast of Cannes; cycling from Antibes to Juan-les-Pins, with regular stops for a refreshing swim; taking a short walk out of Menton to cross the border into Italy ...

Once again, there were no surprises regarding the general favourite from amongst all the places that the young men got to see: as on so many past tours, it is the town of Villefranche, just a few kilometres to the east of Nice, which consistently retains its place at the very top of the "leader-board" of local attractions; its ochre-coloured buildings and brightly-painted shutters, its beautiful beach and crystal-clear water continue to take one's breath away, no matter how many times one sees the town ... and remember, any train ride between Nice and the nearby Italian border affords one another chance to take in this marvellous vista, as the tracks skirt the sea-side and duck in and out of deep and dark tunnels.

Mention must be made of all that was eaten during the boys' time in the south of France! There were powerful blue-veined cheeses; sharp and tangy cheeses protected by their layers of mould; cheeses wrapped in vine leaves; cheeses that feature a layer of ash cut through the middle; the young men also ate *tapenade* (a delicious olive paste that accompanies buttered bread or toast); they ate garlic with everything;

some of them ate rabbit; they ate the stuffed and deep-fried flowers of courgettes, a local speciality; they ate all kinds of tomatoes that some chaps had never seen before (be sure to "google" a picture of a tomato called the "Coeur de Boeuf" or the "Heart-of-a-bull" tomato, which is apparently only found in Europe). In fact, these intrepid tourists ate EVERYTHING! On more than one occasion, boys would even arm-wrestle just to see who could finish Madame Richter's plate of food, whenever she had had her fill!

For dessert, an ice-cream stand was found in Old Nice, a family-run establishment that must offer about seventy different flavours! Amongst the more exotic options, there was beer-flavoured ice-cream, cactus-flavoured ice-cream ... olive flavour ... poppy flavour ... tomato-and-rosemary flavour ...

Oh, and of course quite a few dishes were flavoured with powerful and pungent Provencal garlic!

One baking-hot afternoon, the College boys even tried frogs' legs, having made a lunch-time reservation in an appropriately cool and dark restaurant. The restaurateur set the youngsters up at a long table in the middle of the shop, and even brought out Madame (the chef) from behind her stove, in order that she might tell them all more about the delicacy they were about to eat. These weren't the dainty and modest legs which have been enjoyed on previous tours: these bad boys had been shipped in all the way from Vietnam, but they had been given local flavour thanks to their careful and painstaking preparation, firstly in salt, and then in olive oil and parsley ... and garlic, of course! Each portion featured three sets of legs, and each leg probably measured between ten and twelve centimetres. Sure, they taste like chicken, as one is always told ... but, ... "Were they nice?", asked Monsieur from the front desk. The boys were asked for their individual ratings (on the Richter Scale, out of Ten) ... and the lowest rating was an eight! There

# ACCELERATED ART PROGRAMME (AAP)

Teacher-in-Charge: Ms K. Spindler

The Accelerated Art Programme runs as a series of Friday afternoon workshops (15:00 - 17:00) that are designed to develop the technical skills and knowledge of those showing exceptional talent and/or commitment to the visual arts. The workshops are open to students across the grades in the college whether or not they take art as a subject. This year AAP students have participated in a range of exciting and diverse projects including; large-scale relief printing, oil painting in the environment, street art, and contemporary mark-making.

■ Large-scale relief printing: Last year the art department was given an enormous roll of linoleum. It was this roll that served to inspire a large-scale relief printing project. Boys had to collaborate with their classmates to interpret a project brief, compose and cut an interesting image, and print. Because of the size of the prints, the etching presses in the Simpson Centre were too small to accommodate the printing process, and plates were printed with a combination of first using a cricket pitch flattener, and then rubbing the surface with a spoon. During the Friday printing sessions, we were visited by a range of artists including printmaker Natasha Norman,

and Grace Cross and Io Makandal of Open Drawer Projects (ODP).

■ Oil Painting with Ashley Bestbier: During the April school holidays a group of boys accompanied Ashley Bestbier and Katherine Spindler on a landscape painting expedition painting landscapes in different parts of the peninsula. On site they battled the elements as they learned appropriate oil painting techniques from an experienced landscape painter. Painting in a public space elicited positive responses from passers-by. One gentleman stopped his car to congratulate the boys on the quality of their work. In addition, the press arrived one day and snapped photographs for a newspaper article.

**Collaborating with Andrew Breitenberg (Selah):** Recently AAP boys collaborated with street artist Andrew Brietenberg (Selah) on a piece of work on the subway wall directly opposite Bishops. The project afforded boys the opportunity to work with a practising international street artist and in a public space. In addition to being given a lecture on contemporary street art, cutting stencils and developing an understanding of what is involved when spraying, boys were introduced to the challenges of working in a public space and on public property. Meetings were held with our local




Ward Councillor, Matthew Kempthorne, who was most enthusiastic about our proposal and offered us all of the subways in his jurisdiction. After continued discussions we have decided to rather approach neighbouring schools and challenge them to get involved as Cape Town approaches World Design Capital 2014. Our current collaboration with Andrew will be completed by the end of September 2012. We look forward to future projects with Andrew, particularly projects that are involved in addressing social injustice in poorer areas.

■ Open Drawer Project (ODP): During two weekends in August (one of which was a long weekend break) artists from The Open Drawer Projects ran an in-depth workshop on contemporary mark-making with several of the Accelerated Art boys. Boy were introduced to a wide range of artists and artworks and created drawing mechanisms that produced drawings. Joshua Hewitson created a drawing mechanism that was powered both mechanically (with a small handle) and also by the wind. Please see the images below. This workshop was offered at a fortuitous time as the Matric theme for this year's practical exam had just been announced: Play. We in the Simpson Centre hope that many of the boys will apply the new skills (conceptual and practical) that they learned during the workshop to their upcoming exam work.

In addition to the aforementioned projects, Ashley Bestbier has offered several workshops for those students in Matric who are working hard to complete and compile their portfolios for university submissions. 

He has done so well on his achievements and served to motivate a number of other boys to take up the sport competitively.

Another adventure that takes place at Bishops and relates to Field and Stream is the White Rhino Trail. This is a wonderful experience offered to boys in Grade 11. The boys walk in the Umfolozi Game



Reserve accompanied by two game guards who have a wealth of knowledge. What makes the trip of great significance is that the boys learn about the ecosystem, threats to this area (particularly the affects of mining by an Australian company on the boarder of the reserve) and the significance of the Zulu culture and traditions that dictated the management of wildlife in the area before the game park was established. In a letter to the parents (in May) of boys going on the June trip, the following was said: "I would like to confirm details of the White Rhino Trail your son will be going on in June. It is a life changing experi-

ence as it allows a person the opportunity to examine his mental, physical, social and spiritual values in a unique setting. I count it an honour to host your son for this event. The staff member accompanying me is Mr. Burgert Maree. To date, a total of 199 rhino have been poached in South Africa this year. It almost seems certain that this group will be getting a glimpse of what few will get a chance to see in future years". The boys were split into two groups. Mr. Maree proved to be a fantastic staff facility. I had the opportunity to accompany the second group. The Trail Officers were Mandla Buthelezi and Artist Gqwetha for the one group and Mandla Gumede and Vuyani Mbuzwa. Two students from LEAP joined the trailists and this added a further dimension to the experience, as neither had been near a game reserve before and thoroughly enjoyed it. A special vote of thanks must go to Sean van Wyk from Hi-Tec who sponsored high quality hiking boots for the LEAP students.


#### HISTORY

#### Teacher-in-Charge: Dr R. Warwick

On Wednesday, 15 August, several History Society members attended an evening, public presentation at the Cape Town Holocaust Centre, accompanied by Dr Rodney Warwick and Reverend Terry Wilke. The speaker was Sir Richard Evans, Regius Professor of History at Cambridge University; the subject being Evans's role as an expert witness for the defence in a highly publicised libel case during 2000. American historian Deborah

Lipstadt was sued by David Irving, a British military historian, who during the late 1980s onwards began to acquire notoriety as a "holocaust denier". Lipstadt had accused Irving of "distorting evidence and manipulating documents" to serve his own political purposes, most specifically conclusions exonerating Hitler for his role in World War Two and even casting doubt upon the existence of the Holocaust, as it is generally explained and understood within historical accounts. Evans who is one of the foremost contemporary experts on German history, through pain-staking examination of Irving's sources and footnotes, was able to prove beyond all reasonable doubt that Lipstadt's accusations were entirely valid, resulting in Irving losing his case, both to his own financial cost and academic reputation. For History Society students attending, it was a lesson on how academic history is written and that core historical truths are certainly attainable through documentary and other evidence. But also that individual historians such as Irving with their own often sinister political agendas, can also be conclusively proven as scholastic frauds. This is an important realization in a world where the internet particularly is dominated by so many purportedly informative sites on historical or political matters, but with no verification worth speaking of. *Rodney Warwick* 




#### **INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS**


#### LINGUA FRANCA

#### ROWING

#### WORLD ROWING SENIOR AND JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS Plovdiv, Bulgaria, 2012

A squad of 12 South African athletes, 9 boys and 3 girls competed in the 2012 World Rowing Junior Championships, in Plovdiv, Bulgaria, of which two of the boys were from Bishops. The process of rowing for South Africa begins months and years before the event, but starts coming to a head soon after the SA Schools Rowing Championships. Initial trials consisted of a weekend of seat racing on a dam in Pretoria. This means racing with different people in different boats, up to 15 times over 1500m during the weekend. While **James Johnston** was selected after this process for the Single Scull, more trials needed to be done to select a Quad, as a crew boat has many dynamics to it. This meant **Oliver Husband** stayed in Pretoria and trialled for 6 more days before the final line up for the Quad was made. After selections the training accelerated. James stayed in Cape Town, while Oliver moved to Pretoria for a term to train with his crew. This meant added pressure to keep on top of his school work from afar.

The first test after selections was to compete at the SA Senior Championships in East London. The Junior team comprising of a Boys' and Girls' Single Scull (Bishops and DSG) and Boys' and Girls' Pair (St John's and St Andrew's Girls), a Boys' Double (Hilton) and a Boys' Quad (Bishops, St Albans and Bishop Bavin) fared exceptionally well, often putting the seniors to shame in their respective events. Following this was a prognostic regatta at the U23 trials in Pretoria and then possibly the highlight of

training, a 16-day training camp in Tzaneen with the U23 squad and the Olympic Pair and Lightweight Coxless Four. This was an invaluable opportunity to train with literally the best rowers in the world. But not only train, as the seniors were very supportive and welcoming in their advice and tips on and off the water. Training pieces, 10km time trial runs and relaxed dinners were all shared daily. This really opened up their eyes to what is needed to be an Olympic champion.

Following the camp were two short weeks back at school before the squad again met in Johannesburg for an Awards Evening where the squad was presented with their SA Junior Rowing Colours, the last few tune up sessions, then the long flight to Sofia and bus transfer to Plovdiv, Bulgaria. The city history has records dating back to 4000 BC. So, it was fitting to have the Opening Ceremony in the old Roman Amphitheatre high up on the hill in the old part of the town, looking over the valley and city below. 56 countries were welcomed into the theatre by over 1000 athletes, all their supporters and dignitaries from every corner of the world. James was honoured by being elected to be the flag bearer for the South African team.

Racing started the next day with the Boys' Quad and Girls' Pair. While the girls found the competition very steep the boys managed to comfortably make it through to the quarter finals with only 3 crews being eliminated from the heats. The next day all the boats were in action. The Quad needed to come in the top 3 to progress to the A/B semi while James needed to make top 4 in the heats as the slowest 10 boats were eliminated. This was done in relative case (as much as one can at World Champs), with James finishing 3rd in the 6th fastest time of the day. The Quad however had more of a race. With 1000m to go they were lying 4th with a very strong USA crew in third. They then started one of the more exciting finishing sprints in the regatta. Clear inspiration was gained from the Olympic Four who outsprinted

Aus, Den and GB to take Gold. The guys came back in the last 500m to not only break the Americans but challenge the NZ quad too. This result put them in the A/B semi. James's quarter final was more straight forward, until the last 250m. After a competitive start he slowly moved away from the rest of the field, following the Slovenian through the middle 1000m. But, needing a 3rd the Dutch and Argentine started battling it out and in the last 250m were closing rapidly on the leaders. James however did just enough to hold them off and finish 2nd, thus qualifying for the A/B semi and entering the history books for SA Junior Rowing.

Unfortunately the semi finals were not a successful as the quarters for either crews. The Quad, after trying to get back in touch in the last 500m, again failed to finish the sprint they had the day before, finishing 5th to go to the B final. James too had a hard semi missing out on the A final by 2sec to Chi, Aze and, Czech. The finals were again hard fought, with everyone fighting for pride if not medals. The quad finished 5th just ahead of a strong British crew. James fought valiantly to finish 3rd behind Slovakia and Belarus.

So, Oliver in the JM4x ended up 11th out of the quads finishing just behind last year's World Champions in the event, Germany, and beating much bigger and traditionally fast crews like the British and Australians. James finished 9th in the world, in the single. It is hard to describe what an achievement that is in the single scull. The field he raced against was not only the largest, but also the most experienced. He raced, to name but a few, the current world record holder, the 7th place finisher at this year's U23's Lightweight Singles, 3 senior World Cup veterans and one sculler who missed out on Olympic qualifications by 0.5sec. It is also the best result that a South African Junior Men's sculler has ever achieved. A mention must be made of the exceptional result of Jenienne Curr of DSG, who won Silver in the Girls' Single. This is the first medal a South African Junior Woman has ever won in an Olympic boat class in any world champs. A mass of experience has been learned by both athletes as competitors. What it means and takes, to compete against the best in the world. Added to that the global friendships made that transcend language and cultures. It has been an unparalleled life experience that will no doubt hold them in good stead in life and as athletes.

#### RUGBY

Last year, I articulated my views, in general terms, on the state of Bishops rugby - where it was positioned within the school itself, and the wider community. I wrote about sustainability and the way forward. I also spoke in more specific terms about what I believed needed to be done to ensure that we were on track. As TiC Rugby, I set myself specific goals. 2011 passed in a flash and I think it's important to do an audit of where we are 12 months down the line – a progress report, if you will. In true schoolmaster fashion (having just completed my midyear reports!), I will borrow from the academic industry symbols we are so familiar with, but will limit myself to the tried-and-trusted good, adequate, cause for concern ratings.

#### **GENERAL OBSERVATIONS**

#### 1 Where would the school like to position itself?

L Recent correspondence from the Headmaster's Desk suggests that rugby remains at the heart of the sporting life of our school. In a letter entitled, *Rugby Matters*, Vernon Wood stated, "the reality is that rugby is a very important part of life at Bishops. It is the sport that fields the highest number of teams of any sport code at the school and consequently is the sport with the most participants in the school." This is a most positive development, as concern had been expressed in a number of quarters that perhaps this was no longer the case.

**Rating**: Good

#### **O** Sponsorship

 $\angle$  I'm delighted to be able to report that the relationship between Vital Health Foods and Bishops Rugby is as strong as ever and we are extremely grateful for that. In addition, through

the proceeds of the *Platinum Blue* magazine, a Rugby Development Fund has been established, to provide finance for further rugby initiatives.

**Rating:** Good

#### 3 Is Bishops Rugby a competitive force in the Western Province High Schools Premier League?

In the past, a strong 1st XV performance would mask the sometimes mediocre results of the other teams. This year, however, the chickens have come home to roost – the 1st XV has had an extremely tough time of late and results across other age groups have come into sharper focus. Historically, we have always struggled against the Paarl schools, but this year we've seen a marked improvement by SACS and WBHS against us. It is no coincidence that both of these schools (SACS in particular) have embarked on rigorous programmes to improve their rugby structures.

**Rating:** Cause for concern

#### SPECIFIC GOALS

#### Bishops coaches must be 'singing off the same hymn sheet'.

**I** Some progress has been made in this regard. I began with the Prep where Brendan Fogarty (MiC) and Greg Brown (Headmaster) kindly arranged for all coaches to be present at Lutgensvale for a coaching seminar on a public holiday. I outlined what I was hoping to achieve with regard to the age-related development and expectations of generic skills, underpinned by our philosophy of Bishops rugby which is an expansive, fast-paced game dependent on a high level of skills and decision making. My assistants, Gareth Hayden (skills), Kevin Foote (defence) and Stephen Knoop (scrums and lineouts) then used both the College and Prep 1st XVs to demonstrate practical drills. These were all filmed and a DVD will be produced. At the College, my assistant coaches and I have tried to visit as many teams as possible over the course of this term. Time and time-tabling are factors and this has not happened nearly as often as I would've liked.

**Rating:** Adequate.

#### **∩** Bishops boys must be better conditioned.

 $\checkmark$  This is an area where we have seen the biggest discrepancy between ourselves and our traditional rivals. I have visited a number of their facilities and we are lagging way behind. So, what steps have I taken to combat this? I have used funds raised through the *Platinum Blue* magazine to construct a conditioning area at the back of the Piley Rees field. But that, in itself, is not going to solve the problem. We need regular sessions time-tabled during the off-season – and not just for the 1st XV squad. To this end, I have approached Richard Smith in the LO department. He is a qualified biokineticist and will attempt to introduce these sessions as part of the Phys Ed component in the subject. This will benefit the entire school, not just the rugby fraternity. In addition, both he and Tiaan Campher (1st XV biokineticist) will make themselves available for team sessions in the afternoons. I have also pushed for the total refurbishment of the school gym so that Tiaan can be on-site to supervise programmes. Vernon Wood in *Rugby Matters* wrote, "a complete revamp of the gym and our training programmes therein is underway. We are seeking to maximise training opportunities through the introduction of cross training programmes under a full time biokineticist who will ensure that the training will benefit all the sports in which a Bishops boy participates." So plans are in place but they are yet to be properly implemented. **Rating:** Cause for concern

#### **O** Recruitment of talented players must be a priority.

 ${f J}$  History has shown that successful College sides were, more often than not, a product of the WPPS and Bishops Prep teams that came through the system. Wet Pups has been struggling of late, but Bishops Prep is certainly in excellent hands. But is that enough? The answer, unequivocally, is no. Natural intake alone and a 'lucky packet' approach to the relative strengths of age groups is not the answer. I was pleased to read that Bishops will address their admission policy as noted by Vernon Wood in Rugby Matters, "Performance in the Common Entrance Test, while important to preserve the academic stature of the school, would not be the sole factor in determining entrance for a limited number of applicants into the school, but that sporting prowess could play more of a role." In addition, however, provision must be made for the recruitment of a limited number of players in the U16/17 age category. It is indisputable that our rugby results of late are as poor as they've ever been and while coaching and conditioning are clearly important we need talented players in our system to compete in the Premier League. Let me be absolutely clear in saving that every single other Premier League school in the country recruits aggressively. If we are to be compared with other top rugby schools then let's compare apples with apples and level the playing fields.

**Rating:** Cause for concern

**Bishops needs a Director of Sport.** There are only two things every boy at Bishops must do – attend class and play sport. Yet the support systems and infrastructure of these two spheres of school life are vastly different. Of course academics are the raison d'être of an educational institution, but with only a Deputy Headmaster (Sport, Culture and Discipline) and the Teachers-in-Charge to look after its interests, sport is in dire need of greater assistance. If one considers that every TiC is, first and foremost, a teacher and that administrative responsibilities take up the bulk of their sporting time, then precious little is left to focus on direction. The appointment of a Director of Sport would re-inforce the school's philosophy that every pupil play a team sport in winter and summer, and it would help every boy to fulfil his sporting potential, while also ensuring that the school remains competitive by striving for sporting excellence.

**Rating:** Cause for concern

By 2013, I will strive to transform the 'cause for concern' industry ratings to 'good'. We all know that 'excellent' will then be just around the corner.

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#### SAILING

#### LIPTON CUP 2012

This year Bishops once again took part in the Lipton Challenge Cup. The Cup was donated by Sir Thomas Lipton and the challenge created by a deed of gift in 1908 for the encouragement of deep sea racing in Southern Africa. Since then it has become the most prestigious sailing event in South Africa, and naturally attracts top sailors from around the country. The deed of gift invites all yacht clubs in South Africa to enter one team each to compete for the Lipton Cup annually. This year the Bishops team consisted of: Travis Barrett; Ian Douglass; Alexander Rohrer; Nicholas Ryall; Matthew Van Der Linden; Adam Van Der Ploeg and Murray Willcocks at the helm.

The regatta requires all competitors to use the same type of boat. This means that each boat and crew has to meet a specific set of requirements in order for the race to be a test of sailing skill and not boat design. Included in this is a maximum weight allowed per crew (420 kg). We were 450 kgs one week before the racing started necessitating a loss of 5kg per crew member on average. By the 5pm cut off time for the Friday weigh-in we were still 2 kgs overweight. And it was Murray's birthday. Self discipline meant that the cake had to wait. By 09h00 on Saturday after a strict control of the intake on Friday and a workout in the Navy gym on Saturday morning we were down to 418.6 kgs and could enjoy a massive breakfast and Murray's cake!

The regatta takes place in the defending champion's home waters with one race sailed each day for six days. Included in the six days are four compulsory courses, which each have to cover a distance of over twelve nautical miles (1.86km). This year the regatta was hosted by False Bay Yacht

Club in Simons Town and sailed in False Bay. With light to moderate winds, False Bay provided some challenging sailing with the top five boats all in close contention for the overall win. In the end it was Royal Natal Yacht Club in first place followed closely by Royal Cape Yacht Club in second, just one point behind. The Bishops team had a good consistent regatta with an overall position of 13 out of 25 competitors. Included in our results is a 6th, the best a Bishops team has ever done in a Lipton Cup race. The results are as follows: 14; 13; 16; 12; 6.

A big thank you to the Jewish Maritime League, who have yet again provided their boat JML1 for us to sail, and Royal Cape Yacht Club, in particular Ron Keytel and Toni Mainprize, who have spent countless hours making it possible for Bishops to take part. Also to our sponsors: Bondiblu and Lalizas, thank you, and to Bishops for providing a platform and allowing the sailors to miss school to compete in an age-old competition.
